

Yugoslavia has agreed to resume friendly relations with the Soviet Union. The main issues between the two countries have been ironed out. That's the unofficial report from Belgrade.

However it is Belgrade reports that Tito has no intention of being drawn behind the Iron Curtain. That he has been insisting in his talks with Khrushchev and Bulganin - that Yugoslavia will not be tied to either the East or the West. We hear that an official statement will be issued, after the conference ends. The statement to stress peaceful co-existence - and non-intervention.

According to Belgrade reports, it looks as if Tito has had pretty much his own way in dealing with Khrushchev and Bulganin. They came asking him to return to the Communist Internationale - which he refused to do. The two Soviet bosses having swallowed that humiliation - and saying "yes" to the rest of his demands. Which is quite a change from the days when Stalin was calling Tito a Fascist and an enemy of Communism.

VACCINE

President Eisenhower announces that enough "Salk

EISENHOWER

During the presidential press conference today, Mr. Eisenhower spoke for a few moments about his job. The remarks, resulting from a reminder by one of the newsmen that -- tomorrow it will be just three years since General Ike returned from Europe, and entered politics as a candidate for the Republican nomination. The President was asked, how does he feel about politics -- and ~~xxxxxx~~ about being President?

First of all, President Eisenhower admitted that he still has, as he put it -- "no great liking for politics." But he then added that, in saying this, he was using the term "politics" in a derogatory sense.

Then he went on to say that he does find being President "a fascinating business." Pointing out that the President of the United States is a powerful figure in world politics -- with a real chance to work for international peace and prosperity. Also, that he is always meeting such interesting people -- Prime Ministers, scientists, writers, and so on and so on. He admits the work ~~that~~ falls upon

the shoulders of the President can be very fatiguing.

But that it's also intriguing. He summed up as, "a wonderful experience."

All of which sounds as if he is not sorry that he became President. ~~But~~ once again he carefully avoided saying whether or not he wants another four years of it!

AIRMEN

PRISONERS

President Eisenhower said at his news conference today that he has no information about whether Red China will free more than fifty other Americans they are holding. They have liberated four of our airmen. That's all we know. During his press conference the President was asked whether he knew what had happened to the other American prisoners. He ~~sa~~ replied that he did not. All a mystery to our government.

The President said he just isn't sure why the four were released. The Reds claim they are trying to relieve international tension. Evidently on a bit-by-bit basis.

During the news conference, the President said he is going to San Francisco on June twentieth. To welcome delegates to the Tenth Anniversary of the founding of the United Nations.

The Israeli government formally protests to the United Nations Truce Commission - following that ²~~big~~ battle yesterday in the Gaza strip, ~~between Israeli and Egyptian forces.~~ The Israeli contention is ~~that~~ ~~Egypt~~ that Egyptian soldiers fired on their settlements - and that the fire had to be returned. Two Israelis were killed; ~~and~~ six wounded, ~~in that battle.~~ The Israelis add, that ~~the~~ Egyptians fired on an ambulance engaged in evacuating the wounded.

Today, the head of the Israeli Foreign Office summoned U.N. Truce Chief, General Burns, and warned him that Israel took a ~~very~~ serious view of the clash.

Meanwhile, in Cairo, an Egyptian spokesman charges that the fighting began when a party of Israelis rolled across the Gaza border in armored vehicles. The ^U Egyptian contention is that the Israelis attacked an Egyptian force - which returned the fire.

Here's the latest. The Armistice Commission declares that the Egyptians were responsible for yesterday's incident. According to its official report, the first shots were fired by Egyptian soldiers - who tried to destroy an Israeli jeep ~~riding~~ on Israeli territory.

BRITAIN

Queen Elizabeth has signed that royal proclamation -- ~~and~~ declaring a state of emergency within her realm -- requested by Prime Minister Eden. The President of the Privy Council, Lord Salisbury, flew to Balmoral Castle in Scotland. With him went the royal proclamation. He got Her Majesty's signature, and then flew straight back to London, to put it in the hands of Prime Minister Eden.

The proclamation authorizes the Prime Minister to use Army, Navy and Air Force personnel in order to ~~keep~~ keep the railroads operating. Otherwise the ~~strike~~ strike would paralyze transportation. And how would millions get their food supplies? The document enables the Prime Minister to commandeer trucks and automobiles to carry workers. Also to send the soldiers to move supplies from the docks. This means he now has all the authority he needs to make sure food stocks do not fall to a dangerous level. This is the same power that Winston Churchill had during the war -- except that "a state of emergency" does not mean martial law.

Meanwhile, goods today were piling up on docks -- with more than two hundred ships idle in the ports from London to Liverpool. Also, London commuters were having a time, trying to get home by bus. Others were driving their cars and picking up neighbors. Some forty thousand additional cars choking the main highways that serve London. "Chaos everywhere," was the way The London Evening News described it.

That's the situation, as the royal proclamation goes into effect.

ATTLEE

The man responsible for the defeat of the Labor Party in the British election - Clement Attlee. So says the London Daily Mirror. ^{in an} ~~The~~ attack on the former Prime Minister ~~is~~ surprising ~~because the Mirror is the biggest of the Labor newspapers.~~

^{the Daily Mirror} ~~It says in an~~ ^{says} editorial that Attlee is too old for the job of leading the Party. It doesn't suggest anyone to replace him - but it does say that he must either resign, or ^{be} ~~ousted~~ ^{be kicked out} by the Party. In the words of the editorial, "Attlee talks like the leader of an old boys' brigade."

In other words, the paper thinks that Labor might have done better with a young fighting leader; - which ^{is sure to} ~~no doubt is~~ giving ^g some satisfaction to Aneurin Bevan, who for some years has been hoping to take ^{over} the leadership of the Laborites, ~~away from Attlee,~~ and who ^{He is} ~~certainly is~~ a young fighting leader.

CHURCHILL

Senator George Smathers of Florida says that he has forty-six of his colleagues lined up -- ready to sign his resolution in honor of Sir Winston Churchill. The Smathers resolution to put Congress on record as expressing appreciation for Churchill's immense contribution to the cause of freedom -- and his efforts to stem the tide of Communism.

The Florida Senator drafted his resolution shortly after Churchill resigned as Prime Minister. Then the Senator held it up for a few weeks, so no one could say he was trying to influence the British elections. Now that those elections are over, he wants a Congressional salute to the world's most famous living statesman.

DESEGREGATION

The Supreme Court hands down a major ruling - that undoubtedly will cause a big change in this country. The subject - desegregation.

Chief Justice Warren read the unanimous opinion of the Court. All state and local laws requiring segregation in schools - are nullified. ^{And} No state in the future may appeal to its own legislation - against the decision of the Supreme ~~Court~~ Court. Today's statement calls upon all authorities to and do it implement the decision in good faith.

But ^{the} ~~today's~~ ruling does not demand universal desegregation immediately. It gives the states the right to handle the problem ^{each} according to the local situation. School authorities will be allowed to go slow - if they can prove that delay is necessary and in the public interest.

The important thing is - that the Supreme Court condemns segregation altogether - and forbids any defense of it on the basis of old local ^{custom or law.} ~~customs or laws~~

One of the first reactions came from Governor

Raymond Gary of Oklahoma, ^{who} ~~the governor~~ ^{terms} the ruling as
"fair and reasonable." ^{He says} ~~he declares that~~ some areas of his
state won't be ready for desegregation for ~~some~~ years - but he
supports the Supreme Court, on the necessity of making
desegregation work eventually ⁱⁿ ~~throughout~~ Oklahoma.

^{How about} ~~But~~ the Deep South, ^{it} doesn't take so kindly to the ^{new} development. Referring to the Justices of the Supreme Court,
one Georgia school superintendent remarked: "They've closed up
the schools in Georgia." And observers in Atlanta declare that
the movement to kill the public school system in Georgia will go
full speed ahead now - the schools to be turned into private
^{in order to go on as in the past.}

GUNMAN

The gunman who did the shooting in Dayton, Ohio, today - is referred to as a religious maniac. Richard Meyers, stormed into the Third National Bank, gun in hand and began spraying shots all over the place. Customers and employees ducked for cover, or raced into the street in a panic. Within seconds the mad man had killed three and wounded several others. Then he ran into Winters National Bank, next door. Again spraying shots around. This time he merely wounded one man, before the police brought him down, with their guns.

Just before he died, he gasped, "I did it for my God". Those were the only words anyone heard him say during the whole affray. Obviously, a religious maniac. Four dead, counting the man who shot up the two Dayton Banks, and four wounded.

BOAT

Four persons adrift in an open boat on Long Island Sound, rescued today - by submarine. John Solgeski, of Glastonbury, Connecticut, took his son and two other boys fishing. They rented a motorboat, chugged out into the Sound - and were last seen at eight P.M. yesterday.

After the alarm had been given, the Coast Guard began searching. But it was the submarine "Torsk" that finally located the motorboat; out of gas - and drifting. And that, Hugh, was surely one of the strangest rescues ever made on Long Island Sound; by a submarine.

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
