Good Evening Everybody:

The threat of a major railroad strike always has repercussions - through much of our national economy. Take, for example - the auto industry.

When things like rubber and steel can't move by rail the car assembly line begins to slow down. Leading to lay offs - and even the closing of plants -/the strike goes on for long.

In other words - we are all affected when the railroad workers walk off their jobs. Not to mention the inconvenience to millions of passengers - who ride the train every day. That's the reason for the feverish activity in Washington. President Johnson trying to head off a strike - before the midnight deadline. Or, one minute past midnight - to be

precisely accurate. The President, ordering the Secretary of Labor to hold round-the-clock sessions - in an effort to reach a settlement.

Not an easy task for this dispute over the work rules goes back to the Eisenhower administration.

Mr. Eisenhower appointed - a special commission to study the work rules. President Kennedy appointed - an emergency board. Nevertheless, the dispute - stayed alive, and until late today, like a locomotive, was brreling down the tracks - toward tonight's deadline.

But the latest:- Pres. Johnson has called on both sides to back off from a strike for at least twenty days. And give him their answer early tonight.

MACARTHUR

It seems that General Douglas MacArthur is going to be a controversial figure - in death as in life. Old animosities flaring up - as his remains were receiving solemn homage on Capitol Hill.

Seventy-five thousand people filed through the Capitol Rotunda - for a last salute to the departed hero. Then the casket was closed - and taken to Norfolk, Virginia, where, on Saturday, there will be a funeral - with full military honors for one of the great military men of our time.

But the controversies of the past - are not being buried with the old soldier. Not after that story is released - by Scripps Howard Newsman Jim Lucas, and Bob Considine of the Hearst press.

For one thing, the story itself - is under attack. General Courtney Whitney, MacArthur's aid, saying "fictional nonsense." And General Whitney denies that MacArthur ever spoke contemptuously of

fellow Generals like Dwight Eisenhower. And, that
the MacArthur charge of British "betrayal" - referred
to Burgess and MacLean, the two British diplomats who
spied for the Russians. But those stories are backed
up by MacArthur's Chief of Intelligence, General
Willoughby.

As for the MacArthur Korean strategy - it's getting strong support from General Mark Clark, allied commander in the Far East at the time of the Korean War - who still thinks MacArthur was right, that we should have sealed the Chinese border - with atomic weapons, and then crushed the Red forces - south of the Yalu.

KHRUSHCHEV

The boss of the Kremlin is going to
excommunicate - strong men of Red China. That seems
clear - from these words of Nikita Khrushchev. "The
Chinese have abandoned - the great Communist movement!
Which means that Khrushchev - cannot control Mao Tse
Tung and has decided - to give him the boot.

That's the moral - of Khrushchev's visit to

Hungary. The Soviet Premier obviously preparing the

Communist parties of Eastern Europe - for a shattering

split of the Red monolith, and taking care to put all

the blame - on Peking. Now, Khrushchev prefers to

it as an "alien ideology", preached by the Chinese Reds.

So says that one time Stalinist - Nikita Khrushchev.

The phrase "deadly error" comes from
Bergen-hohne, West Germany. And pm graphically

describes what happened - during an anti-tank

exercise. West German and foreign officers were

observing a mortar barrage - when one gunner made

a "deadly error". Raising his sights too high.
