Wonders of Red propaganda - in the turmoil of Tibet.

The Moscow radio, today - blaming the rebellion on the United

States and Britain. "Imperialistic circles," to use the Red

verbiage - inciting the "Reactionary" revolt. "Reactionary" -
being more communist persiflage.

The Moscow radio states that the United States and Britain have long had notions of seizing Tibet. Drawing up a plan ten years as - for turning the roof-of-the-world into an American-British colony.

The barfaced impudence of this - remarks with the Chinese Reds # doing a brutal job of Imperialism in the high Himalayas.

Propaganda from Communist China, however - concentrates
on India. The Peiping radio, today repeating the statement
that the Tibetan insurgents used the Indian border town of
Kalimpong, as a center for directing the revolt. Prime Minister
Nehru - denounced for the statements he made yesterday, to the
Indian Parliament. Expressing - sympathy for the Tibetans.

The Chinese Red radio, today- warning Nehru to mind his own business.

"The rebellion in Tibet and its suppression," said the broadcast "are entirely internal affairs of China. No foreign country should interfere in the rebellion," it added.

Meanwhile, two groups of Tibetan exiles paid Nehru a visit today, appealing to him - to take the Tibetan insurrection to the United Nations. Nehru telling them - that India has no power to intervene in Tibet. And the in fact, reluctant to do anything that might "aggravate the situation." Those were Nehru's words. He's obviously - embarrassed.

Meanwhile, there's intense interest - in the fate of the Dalai Lama, Reported - to be somewhere south of the Brahmaputra River. The Chinese Reds - going all out in efforts to capture him. Searching for him - by land and air. Communist aircraft - scouting the wild country, with its lofty passes. Soldiers - patrolling the monasteries to keep the monks - from trying to join the living buddha.

A dispatch from Atmandu tells of a Sherpa trader - just arrived in Nepal, Who says he saw Chinese troops at the Rongbuk monastery. That legendary shrine - twelve thousand feet up the northern slopes of Mt. Everest. The Rongbuk monastery, high up on the tallest mountain in the world - is considered one of the holiest in all Tibet.

One report is that the Dalai Lama and his party are nearing the border of India possibly - seek asylum in India. No further word that the Dalai Lama was injured - in his flight.

My own guess being, tonight - that he'll reach the Indian frontier possibly - by trails known only to the Tibetan mountaineers, and unknown to the Chinese Reds.

Last Friday, U.S. officials filed the usual notification with Russian suthorities. A C one-hundred-and-thirty- to fly to Berlin... sltitude- twenty-five thousand feet. The soviet officials- objecting. Stating- that western planes should not fly above ten thousand feet. Limited- to that ceiling.

The American authorities refused to accept any such restriction. The huge transport-taking off and flying to Berlin. Winging- at some twenty-five thousand feet. Whereupon the giant plane was bussed- by soviet fighters. Three migs-doing acrobatics, which carried them only a few feet of the American transport.
