President Eisenhower, today, signed a document that stirs the imagination; As a matter - of mere magnitude. An agreement - to provide India with surplus American farm products. Seventeen million tons of food grains - during the next four years; Including - five hundred and eighty-seven million bushels of wheat, and one million tons of rice. The wheat, alone - more than we consume in this country in the course of a year. Beginning in July, an average of one shipload of wheat will sail from the United States - every day, for four years.

The entire deal comes to one billion, three hundred
million dollars. Five hundred and thirty-eight million
dollars' worth of grain - a gift from the United States to
India. To pay for the rest - we will make loans to the Indian government.

The purpose - to help India build up reserves of food - as a safeguard against famine. The program - an out-growth of President Eisenhower's triumphal visit in India, a few months ago.

The Eisenhower Administration, today -- presented
a program. of medical care for the aged. $A s$ an answer --
to the Old Age Health Plan proposed by the Democrats in Congress.

Today's proposal calls for the Government and the States -- to join in financing a one-billion-two-hundred-million-dollar project. Washington -- to put up half the money. Individual States -- their share of the other half.

The purpose -- to enable people over sixty-five
to get proper medical care, in cases of major illness.
Benefits -- $\quad$ include hospital costs, medical service,
drugs. Individuals $t x$ under the program -- to pay part of the cost. The Federal-State subsidies -- (footing) bill for the remainder. The plan -- called "Medicare.")

The Administration's proposal draws immediate
criticism -- from Democrats in Congress, Who say -- they doubt if States could afford it; Each putting up it its share -- of six hundred million dollars.
