WHEELER FOLLOW VIET NAM

Here at home - a flat statement today from

General Earle Wheeler - Chairman of the Joint Chiefs

of Staff; to the effect that he is sure Communist China

will stay out of the war in Viet Nam - unless there is a

US attack on the Chinese mainland.

General Wheeler basing his statement on military intelligence - as well as a trip last week to the battle zone. (He cautioned, however, that "a number of people" presumably including some in government - do not share his view of what it would take to trigger Chinese intervention.)

PEKING FOLLOW WHEELER,

The Chinese - for their part - apparently more concerned right now with problems at home. For instance, the Peking regime today launching an attack -- against "landlords, rich farmers and reactionary malicious elements' then the factor of withdrawing funds from national banks - to finance a counter-attack against Chairman Mao's "cultural revolution." Radio Peking also telling of an abortive plot by anti-Mao skame elements -- to paralyze land and water transportation in Shanghai.

Meanwhile, a report today from Hong Kong that President Liu has just slipped out of Peking. That
he has now set up new headquarters about two hundred miles
from the capital -- from which he supposedly will "continue
his fight" against Mao.
