The UN's peace envoy - Gunnar Jarring - announced this afternoon that he will open a new round of talks tomorrou between the Arabs and the Israelis, as he put it, to seek a "just and lasting peace" in the troubled Middle East. Jarring says the talks will be held in New York and - in the initial stages at least - with the UN Ambassadors of Israel, Egypt and Jordan participating.

He adds however that it is still his hope that the talks will be elevated to the foreign minister level - which Israel has desired ever since the American sponsored cease fire went into effect seventeen days ago.

meddling in the delicate mid-East peace efforts. Griffin

criticized Fulbright for sexpesting that the UN impose a

settlement just as the mid-east nations prepared to sit down

in the hopes of working out a peace formula.

Three battalions of Cambodian troops have launched an attack against a Communist force holding a strategic village about forty miles north of the capital of Phnom Penh. American bombing planes are supporting the drive - even as a new load of US war supplies arrived in Phnom Penh to boksakx sox bolster Cambodia's armed forces. In Washington, the State Department announced that Cambodia will receive up to forty million dollars worth of such military aid during the next ten months - even though department officials concede the assistance could exceed fortymillion should the ground fighting grow more fierce. When informed of this, Senate Democratic leaders Mike Mansfield expressed concern that such aid might bring a revival of the policies that - as he put it -"led us into our troubles in Vietnam."

R The trouble with Permafrost is simply this it doesn't stay put - it doesn't remain solid. It has two layers. The upper portion - known as the active layer - melts in the summer and slides around precariously on the completely frozen bottom layer, which does remain solid. In Alaska's forests, trees lean at crazy angles while the permafrost's active po layer alternately thaws and refreezes. Heat from cooking stoves may cause houses to sink - kitchen first into muskeg, as the thawed layer is called. Alaskan there are not many railroad trains often crawl very slowly as they cross

humped-back bridges. Highways may turn into rollercoasters unless constantly regraded. pose great problems for an eight hox hundred mile long pipe long that would bring oil from the North Slope to the Gulf of Alaska. To meet the problem, engineers sometimes pour gravel into the upper layer of permafrost - or drive stout pilings deep in for the frozen layer below.
