

The latest bulletin from Denver tells us that "today the progress of the President was satisfactory"

Temperature normal, and most of the day was spent outside the oxygen tent. For lunch the President was allowed a little beef - the most sizable meal he has had since he was stricken on Saturday. The First Lady was with her husband during his lunch - as was their son Major John Eisenhower.

The doctors declare that Mr. Eisenhower is making the usual recovery of a patient who has had an attack of that sort. According to Dr. White of Boston, the first week is the most important - because that's when the scar tissue forms over the affected part. In the President's case the process seems to be going alright. The latest medical judgment is that the President will have a normal recovery - if and the doctors don't believe there will be any. They stress the fact however that he is still very sick.

Press Secretary ~~James~~ Hagerty, said <sup>today that the</sup> ~~that Mr. Eisenhower~~

will remain in the hospital for about a month. Then, another month of convalescence - probably at Gettysburg.

## STOCK MARKET

Tonight we can see rather more clearly the pattern of how the government will run - during President Eisenhower's illness; with the Vice-President to preside over the Cabinet - as he has sometimes done in the past. Presidential Assistant, Sherman Adams to direct activities at the White House.

Attorney General Brownell who hurriedly flew home from Europe says there is no need for him to deliver a ~~in~~ legal opinion on the delegation of presidential powers. That President Eisenhower will be back on the job before long, it is believed. In the meantime the existing officers can carry on.

Vice-President Nixon was given three new bodyguards today. He arrived early at his office - and held a series of conferences with top officials. The National Security Council is scheduled to meet at the White House on Thursday. The Cabinet on Friday. Vice-President Nixon to preside over both sessions.

Sherman Adams was at work today in his office at the ~~White House~~ executive mansion. And Assistant Press Secretary, 

Murray Snyder, has returned from Denver to handle public announcements and other information. With Adams and Snyder both on hand, the White House began to hum again - after being almost deserted since President Eisenhower went to Colorado.

The new situation in Washington is this <sup>- while the Vice President</sup> ~~Mr. Nixon~~

<sup>will</sup> Presidential Assistant Sherman <sup>^</sup> to speak for the administration, ~~Mr.~~ Adams, <sup>^</sup> will make policy <sup>when necessary.</sup>

decisions. ~~However, the Vice President cannot sign official~~

~~papers - which is not considered too important right now,~~

~~with Mr. Eisenhower expected back.~~

As everybody knows the Eisenhower illness has caused a surge of political speculation. The big question - will he now run for another term? Then there's the question of the Democratic nomination - all candidates for that one are sure to be more eager - if Mr. Eisenhower is not their opponent.

But a dispatch from Washington mentions a more immediate issue - foreign policy. As we know, President Eisenhower's prestige abroad is enormous. Seldom has any man had such prestige. He took the lead in the free world - with his atoms-for-peace plan, and in negotiations at Geneva, even the Russians were impressed by his attitude.

But will other nations take the same attitude toward anyone else? The Russians, for example, have often attacked Vice-President Nixon -- calling him a "capitalist warmonger". And even our allies can hardly have the same faith in the Vice-President as they have shown in the President. Observers in Washington fear - that our foreign policy will suffer if the President is away for any length of time. But that may be offset by the vast prestige built up by Secretary of State Dulles.

## ARGENTINA

The new head of the Argentine government today presided over his first news conference. General Lonardi speaking to one hundred foreign journalists in the Casa Rosa Government House in Buenos Aires.

General Lonardi made a number of points about how his government will be run. For one thing he spoke of wanting to strengthen ties with the United States. The General revealed that he once lived for a year in this country - and was greatly impressed by our high standard of living. Also by the way our type of democracy works. He wants good relations between Buenos Aires and Washington.

What about relations with Russia? Peron used to be quite friendly with the Soviets and the Communist satelites. General Lonardi indicated that he intends to change this policy. Today he remarked: "My Cabinet will have to study whether Communism is compatible with ~~Argex~~ Argentine institutions". Which sounds as if the General intends to crack down on the Reds in Argentina.



## ARGENTINA

The converse of anti-Communism would mean better relations with the Vatican. You will recall that Peron was excommunicated for his anti-Catholic policy - and the burning of the Churches. General Lonardi hopes to negotiate a new Concordat with the Vatican. The General a devout Catholic makes it clear that he intends to be good friends with the Pope.

The new Argentine leader also made it clear that he will uproot Peronism, Bring back freedom of ~~the~~ speech and the press; and include all Argentinians in a new democracy. No more strong-man-mob-rule.

And what(s the latest of the ex-Dictator? Is Juan Peron of no further importance to his country? The latest word is that Peron is still aboard that Paraguayan gunboat - still in Buenos Aires harbor - and soon, will be granted a safe conduct by the new government. A safe conduct to let him go into exile. But what of the wealth he may have sent <sup>on</sup> ahead of him. No more word of that.

Egypt will receive arms from both Russia and

Czechoslovakia. Last night, the London Foreign Office revealed

Premier Nasser's deal with the Kremlin. Tonight the Egyptian

Premier announced the deal with the Czechoslovak Reds.

## EGYPT

The London government is naturally apprehensive about this new development. Which might quickly upset the balance of power between Egypt and Isreal. And even more than that, there is that old British fear of Russian influence in the Middle East. During the nineteenth century, the British struggled to keep the Russians of the Czar out. Now the fear is that the ~~Comm~~ Communist Russians may be more successful. Selling arms to Cairo, a threat to what once was a British sphere of influence. Which in turn might be a serious matter to us - now that we have vast oil interests in the Middle East - the largest oil reserves in the world.

## ALGERIA

In Algiers, a special session of the Assembly was called off today, because of opposition by the Moslem delegates. A majority of the Moslems, denouncing the integration of Algeria with France.

A Paris law of nineteen-forty-seven proclaimed the great African territory - an inseparable part of France. Now Governor General Jaques Soustelle has been ordered to tighten up the relations between Algeria and the French Republic. Whereupon the Governor General ~~and~~ called the special session. But when the delegates ~~xxxx~~ assembled, the Moslems - who are in the majority- announced that they had come - only to register their opposition. Then they walked out. Making the special session ~~xxxx~~ impossible. So it has been postponed.

One report states the Governor General is about to resign. But French troops are still fighting Nationalists in the mountains. And some observers believe that instead of resigning, Soustelle may call his troops into Algiers, to help persuade the Moslems - that complete union with France is a good thing. His forces are mostly Berbers and they hold the Algerian Moslem Arabs in contempt.

More fighting in Viet Nam. Premier Diem ordered his army to strike at the ~~xxxx~~ rebels of the so-called religious sects. And today, his commandos stormed ashore on two islands in the river near Saigon. The purpose of the attack, to cut off the Rebel supply line into the Saigon area. The loyalist commandos, smashed ~~th~~ their way across the islands - and tonight both are in the hands of the Government.

Meanwhile, Premier Diem is pressing his ground and air attack some ten miles from Saigon. Two thousand rebels are said to be hiding in the marshes. And the Premier is trying to run them out.

## SKUNK

Today the Chicago police ~~men~~ got a hurry-up call from the Imperial House Restaurant - one of the plush meeting places in the Windy city. Reason - a wood pussy loose on the premises. With a meeting of the Bankers' Association going on.

## HURRICANE

Scores of ships and planes are scouring the Caribbean, looking for the plane that vanished - the hurricane hunter that has been missing since yesterday. No word, not a hint of the fate of the nine airmen and the two Canadian reporters aboard.

The last word from the plane stated that it was moving into a hurricane "Janet" - flying at an ~~xxxx~~ altitude of only about seven hundred feet. After that, the radio went dead.

Veterans of the hurricane squadron believe that the tip-off may lie in the altitude - seven hundred feet. Because, hurricanes over the Caribbean often produce "down gusts" of more than six hundred feet. In other words if the plane was caught in a "down gust" - it may have been slammed into the water.

In Miami, a spokesman for the Navy says it is doubtful if any ~~xxxx~~ could have survived - if that had happened. That if any one survived the crash - his chances of riding out the tremendous seas whipped up by the hurricane, would be nil. So there is little hope for this first plane ever so to vanish. In the history of hurricane hunter squadron nothing of that sort has happened.

## TYPHOON

As for that typhoon in the far Pacific it will hit either Japan or Okinawa. Last night we heard how typhoon "Louise" had blasted Iwo Jima. Today a search plane was sent out and the report is, that Louise slowed down some hundred miles off Japan but still has winds of a hundred-and-forty miles an hour, it is expected to pick up forward speed again - moving either north or northwest. If north - it will hit Japan.
