At Jerusalem - Israel today formally
accepted the $U$ blueprint for peace in the Middle East.

While at Cairo - Egypt was reaffirming its desire for a negotiated settlement. This le ding U $S$ officials to observe - that a cease fire could take effect "within
a week". UN Secretary General U Thant further asserting
.- "there is now a real chance to make important advances."

Israeli premier Golda Meier stressing = however, there will be no withdrawal from occupied Arab lands - until a "binding" peace treaty is signed.

Meanwhile, the fighting continues. Israeli jets today hitting Egyptian targets along the Suez Canal for the seventy-sixth straight day.
Here at home - Hurricane Celia today went
on a two hundred and fifty mile rampage through the
heart of Texas, leaving in her wake - at least nine dead
and more than a thousand injured; also, fires, floods
and wide spread scenes of devastation. Texas Governor

Smith - urging President Nixon to declare the storm
region a disaster area. The Governor asserting that
"Hurricane Celia may prove to be - the most disastrous
storm to hit the Texas Gulf coast in recent times."
Clearly the hardest hit of all though - the well
known Texas coastal city of corpus Christi; which reported - in addition to several dead - an estimated two hundred million in property damage. Corpus Christi's police commander - C. C. Hagan - observing today:
"We aria ain't got no light, no water, nothing but trouble."

 counties in southern Texas - a major disaster area;"

Thus clearing the way for the use of federal funds to help alleviate the damage.

> In the trial of Charles Manson and three
co-defendants at Los Angeles = another attempt was made today to get a mistrial. Defense Attorneys again citing President Nixon inadvertently called Manson "guilty" instead of "allegedly guilty". However, Judge Charles Older - turning down the defense motion, observed that the jury - had not been "exposed" to the President's remarks.

A few hours later though - Defendant

Manson himself getting hold of a copy of a local
newspaper; holding it up - before the eyes of the jury. Its headline reading: "Manson guilty, Nixon declares."

Said Judge older: This thing has been grossly overplayed.

On the war front - Southeast Asia - a captured
enemy document was released today by the U $S$ command
in Saigon; a document wherein Communist commanders -
were ordered to revert to small scale guerrilla warfare.

This - it was said - in order to avoid heavy losses to
their main forces. The enemy paper noting it is now
necessary to "cope" with allied forces - who have "a
large number of troops and war flucilities."

While in Paris - the new US Peace Envoy -

David Bruce - was meeting with his South Vietnamese counter-part, Pham Dang Lam. Ambassador Bruce later telling wax newsmen: "We exchanged views on the problems we have to face together." Pham Dang Lam was then asked - whether Bruce had indicated a "different" approach. He replied: "It's still "too early" to the tell. Lam adding though: "We are both on the same side - and have to solve the same problems."

The Executive Council of the AFL-CIO
-- in session in Chicago; today was demanding double pay for overtime work -- as a means of helping workers fight inflation. The Council also urging an increase in the minimum wage - to two bucks an hour; plus a shortening of the work week - or else the work year.

A FL-CIO President George Meany asserting that "inflation has hit the working man hard," to the point said he - "where millions of working Americans are
slipping backwards - down again to the lowest rungs."

> President Joseph Mobutu of the Republic of the Congo - was at the White House - and welcomed by President Nixon - as the "young leader of a young country with a fine future." This - said the President
"not because of the Congo's natural riches - but
because of its strong vigorous and proogax progressive people and stable leadership.

The President also saying he hopes to
become the first US President - ever to visit Black

Africa.

Said Mobutu simply: The people of the United

States stood by us in time of need.
