money. Over a million pounds sterling - some three million dollars. The biggest robbery in history - near

Leighton Buzzard, England.

The message President Kennedy sent to

Capitol Hill today - makes two basic points. First
that the Nuclear Test Ban Treaty is in the national
interest. Second that there are no hidden strings
attached to it, no under-the-table commitments - to
the Soviet Union, no secret offer made in order to get Khrushchev to sign on the dotted line.

In other words, there is just one issue -
before the members of Congress. Whether or not to
ratify - the limited ban on atomic explosions, to end
testing - in the atmosphere, under water, andin outer space.

The President thinks we should ratify the
treaty and the consensus on Capitol Hill is that

Congress will go along with him.

That most of the nations want this treaty was indicated today at the State Department in

Washington, where a steady stream of diplomats arrived to put their signatures to the document. The Ambassador
from New Zealand - speaking for the rest, said this is
"a triumph of reason and patience $e^{\prime \prime}$.

## Secretary of State Dean Rusk is on the

shores of the Black Sea tonight, at Khrushchev's Villa.

Still - exploring. Sounding out the Soviet Premier-
on possible ways of going beyond the Nuclear Test Ban

Treaty. Perhaps to a general relaxation of tension -
between East and West.

The so-called "hot line" between Washington and Moscow - wasn't so hot today. In fact, it wouldn't have worked - if Kennedy had been trying to ring up Khrushchev. The break in the line - in Finland. An excavator, snapping the cable - from Heisinki to Moscow. A vital link in the communications system - that is supposed to help prevent an atomic war. The repairs took - four hours. Can you imagine the President waiting four hours - to get through to the Kremlin?

The latest Yugoslav earthquake wouldn't be worth mentioning - except for the place. The tremor, too small, to rock the seismographs. No casualties, no damage - in Sarajevo.

Quit There were millions of casualties, and billions in damage - after what happened there, forty-nine years ago. The Austrian Archduke Franz Ferdinand - assassinated by a Serbian patriot in Nineteen Fourteen. The spark that ignited and requited in $a Q$ World War One, the turmoil of the Twentieth Century, touched off by those pistol shots - ai sarajevo.

The confusion in Haiti tonight is reported more so than ever with eighteen soldiers who straggled across the border into the Dominican Republic, saying they were members of the invasion force - and that they were defeated by the army of Duvalier. However a spokesman for the Haitian rebels,
in New York - throws doubt on their testimony. He insists he doesn't know - who they are.

The former President of Colombia - is in jail
tonight. A jail deep in the Colombian jungle - near the Ecuadorian border, a place considered safe for Rojas Pinilla, who is charged with an attempted coup. The ex-head of the Bogota government - accused of an elaborate plot to regain power. Everything from military rebellion to assassination. Rojas Pinilla, all set to strike - at dawn. But the loyalist forces - struck first. Seizing the would be dictator - of Colombia, hustling him off to a prison cell -in the jungle.

There's always something poignant - when a new born baby becomes ill. When the parents happen to be the President and the First Lady - the whole nation shares in the feeling. So its no wonder that messages of sumpathy are pouring in - from all fifty of our States, as well as from abroad.

As you know, Patrick Bouvier Kennedy developed a respiratory ailment shortly after birth.

Tiny Pat's condition so alarming - that he was baptized and rushed - to the hospital in Boston.

Today his condition not improved. The father,
instead of going to Hyannisport, speeding to the hospital
instead. The President, looking rather pale - under
his tan. Worried, about his wife and the premature
baby that is having trouble breathing.

Tonight, we hear that the First Lady - is on the road to recovery. And the latest is that her son is slightly improved.

on a wooden cot with a piece of carpet for a mattress.

He used to get handouts - from the housewives of the
