The White House - President Nixon signed into

law today - a bill providing for the first formal

devaluation of the American dollar since Depression days.

This by means of an increase in the official price of gold 
from Thirty-Five to Thirty-Eight Dollars an ounce; which,

incidentally, adds and instant Eight Hundred Million - to the

value of U.S. gold reserves.

In a written statement, the President calling today's action - "a significant step forward in our overall effort for a stronger and more competitive U.S. economy."

Adding that the U.S. will now intensify its efforts - to achieve trade concessions from other nations. Said the President: "This will be not only in our own interest - but in the interest of a prosperous world economy, a stable monetary system and an equitable trading order."

The synthetic drug methadone - as you may know often used experimentally in the control of herion addiction.

Now comes a report from the U.S. Food and Drug

Administration - aimed at better controlling methadone.

The FDA proposing to bar private doctors - from running their own methadone programs; also, proposing the adoption of new standards - denying methadone to persons under eighteen.

The FDA asserting that "diversion and medical misuse of methadone - are potential dangers." Adding that "strong control over the distribution and use - must be maintained."

Elsewhere in Washington - the Supreme Court strikes another blow for equal rights; but this time - for men. The Supreme Court today ruling unconstitutional - an Illinois law denying unwed fathers the same automatic custody rights as unwed mothers. Justice Byron White observing that such a law - "is inescapably contrary" to legal guarantees of "equal protection."

The High Court ruling, however - the state was right. Agreeing that a homosexual may be denied employment - if he pursues "an activist role in implementing his unconventional ideas."
