## Persian Premier Mossadegh prcbably will take a

 walk out of the United Nations. This was announced by the Deputy Premier today in Teheran - who said that Mossadegh will repudiate the British complaint in the oil dispute, and will take the position that the Security Council has no authority to deal with the question. If the Council insists that it has - Mossadegh will walk out.and the royal signature is needed on a proclamation.

If the King were too 111 to sign, he could delegate authority to the Queen. Eut the word in London is that George the Sixth will be able to sign tomorrow - dissolving Parliament.

Another exchange in the truce negotiations - Supreme
Commander General Ridgway making a reply today to the latest
from the Communists. They rejected his proposal that truce talks be resumed at a neutral village, called Songhyon-Ni.

lines with the heaviest bombardment of the war, and masses of armor were hurled
 for mine the Communist positions. AT one place, a swift advance of some four miles was made by the Canadian Twenty-fifth Brigade, now a part of the British

Commonwealth Division. But in other areas, the offensive was met by heavy fire from Red artillery, mortars and machine guns. and - by howling charges of Chinese and Korean Communists. As the day ended, the powerful U.N. drive was being held back at various places, and there were a couple of slight withdrawals. There was incessant air action,with the U.S. Fifth Air Force flying a hundred sorties, in close support of the offensive on the ground.

## TRUMAN_=こ_DULLES

There seems to be some conflict of opinion between President Truman and John Foster Dulles -- the Republican Foreign Policy spokesman who has been serving as a sococtixer special adviser of the Secretary of State. Dulles was the chief architect of the Japanese Peace Treaty, and today the President said he offered him the post of U.S. Ambassador to Japan. But Dulles refused -on the ground that he should stay in America and save the Republican Party from isolationism. So says the President
-- but Dulles denies it. Yes, he was invited to become the first Post-war Ambassador to Japan and declined. But -- not because he believes the G.O.P. needs to be saved from isolationism. He doesn't think so at all.

The $A_{4}$ omit Energy Committee of Congress is taking

## ARGENTINA

He pointed to the guided missile called - the
Matador. Stories and photographs of that secret weapon were released by the Defense Department. Nevertheless, they should not have been published. So argued the President, and was thereupon reminded - that he, himself, at a news conference, had mentioned the Matador as a "fantastic weapon." He said he didn't remember that.
