#### GOOD EVENING EVERYBODY:

Persian Premier Mossadegh probably will take a walk out of the United Nations. This was announced by the Deputy Premier today in Teheran - who said that Mossadegh will repudiate the British complaint in the oil dispute, and will take the position that the Security Council has no authority to deal with the question. If the Council insists that it has - Mossadegh will walk out.

Parliament opened its final session in London today pending the election of a new Parliament. Prime Minister Attlee presided, and told the Commons that King George continues to improve after the successful operation. Before If the King were too ill to sign, he could delegate authority to the Queen. But the word in London is that George the Sixth will be able to sign tomorrow - dissolving Parliament.

They rejected his proposal that truce talks be resumed at a neutral village, called Songhyon-Ni. So he now suggests - that the Red command name still another place. Meanwhile, the roar of battle thunders along the warfront. The U.N. forces are launching what they call a "limited offensive." But there seems no limit to the violence of the conflict. Today Allied artillery smashed the Red lines with the heaviest bombardment of the war, and masses of armor were hurled for drives at the Communist positions.

AT one place, a swift advance of some four miles was made by

Commonwealth Division. But in other areas, the offensive was met by heavy fire from Red artillery, mortars and machine guns. And - by howling charges of Chinese and Korean Communists. As the day ended, the powerful U.N. drive was being held back at various places, and there were a couple of slight withdrawals. There was incessant air action, with the U.S. Fifth Air Force flying a hundred sorties, in close support of the offensive on the ground.

# TRUMAN -- DULLES

There seems to be some conflict of opinion between President Truman and John Foster Dulles -- the Republican Foreign Policy spokesman who has been serving as a santas special adviser of the Secretary of State. Dulles was the chief architect of the Japanese Peace Treaty, and today the President said he offered him the post of U.S. Ambassador to Japan. But Dulles refused -on the ground that he should stay in America and save the Republican Party from isolationism. So says the President -- but Dulles denies it. Yes, he was invited to become the first Post-war Ambassador to Japan and declined. But -- not because he believes the G.O.P. needs to be saved from isolationism. He doesn't think so at all.

The Atomic Energy a of Congress is taking action for an all-out expansion of our American atomic effort. A resolution to that effect is being prepared, and there'll be The Committee today was given all the known facts - about the new atom bomb test in Russia. Yesterday's White House announcement for the public stated, significantly, that various details were being kept secret - for security reasons. But now the whole story has been to the Committee in confidence. Twe are not told what was revealed, but President Truman gives us one other small point. At his news conference today he said that this country learned of the second Soviet atomic explosion less than ten days ago. He hopes that Red atomic progress will not make war more imminent.

As for the degree of the Soviet progress, it is pointed out that the second explosion would seem to indicate that the Russians are trying out more advanced atomic weapons. The first test they made, a couple of years ago, would have


Italy is renowned as a land of romance, but there can be too much of it - even under Mediterranean skies.
