VIETNAM

On the other side of the globe - Defense Secretary Melvin Laird today completed a three-day mission to Vietnam; a mission he categorized - as "most heartening." Adding again that the Nixon Administration - would "meet or beat" its present May One withdrawal schedule.

Sec. Laird also disclosed that Admiral Moorer - chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff - would be flying to Cambodia tomorrow for a look at the war there. This amid reports that a South Vietnamese task force - was preparing to join up with Cambodian troops. Object: To break the current enemy stranglehold - on Phnom Penh.

UNITED NATIONS

Mideast peace envoy Gunnar Jarring was back at the U.N. today - where he briefed Secretary General U Thant on the results of his trip to Jerusalem. Jarring later meeting with Egyptian and Jordanian ambassadors - bearing with him Israeli peace proposals said to be "the most detailed yet."

Meanwhile, a fourth straight day of fighting - between Palestinian guerillas and loyal Jordanian Army troops. Compelling the chief of an Arab truce team - to fly to London; there to see Jordan's King Hussein - in an attempt to end the violence. Hussein - as you know - currently undergoing a medical check-up - because of an irregular heartbeat. For Cassius Clay - also known as Muhammad Ali another fighting chance to a.v. The U.S. Supreme Court agreeing to hear an appeal from his draft conviction of three years ago.

At the same time though - a T.K.O. for Jimmy Hoffa; who was turned down in his appeal - from a conviction for misusing Teamsters Union pension funds. In effect, the High Court **m** tacking another five years - on the term of eight years which Hoffa is already serving on another charge.

End result - Radio Havana announcing today a new law; providing penalties up to two years in a labor camp - for any able-bodied male found guilty of chronic absenteeism or vagrancy. Here in New York - the National Institute of Student Opinion - announces the results of a survey among some fifty-seven thousand U.S. high school youngsters. Findings well, perhaps surprising.

For example, seventy-six per cent of those polled saying they thought that anyone found burning a U.S. flag should be arrested. Seventy-five per cent - saying they preferred the present letter system of grading - A, B, Cand Fifty-nine per cent - saying they considered air and water pollution the nation's most pressing problem. (Fiftyfive per cent - saying they would like to see an end to the current movie rating system; which bars them, in some cases from seeing the films they would most like to see. And so it goes in high schools - right around the country.)

CHICAGO

Chicago's new Civic Center - which is housed in a thirty-story glass-and-steel building - the pride of the "Windy City"; except for one pesky problem - we hear today. Its bronze-tinted, nine-foot square windows - keep breaking, one after the other, a grand total of three hundred over the past five years - at a repair cost of nearly Four Hundred Thousand Bucks.

The breakage apparently caused by a rust build-up - in the glazing channels of the windows; the result of ineffective sealing. So the trouble - can be and is being eliminated. Says building manager Elmer Halberg: 'La; bly manager in one has been hurt so far - only my pride." Chicago's window pane problem - John Shafer, mainly an expensive \$400,000 pain in the neck.

CAMBRIDGE

At Cambridge, Mass. - Dean Derek Bok of the Harvard Law School - today was named the twenty-fifth president of Harvard University; thereby becoming the first "outsider" to head the nation's oldest university since the Seventeenth Century.
