President Eisenhower has a letter from Soviet Premier Bulganin. A long one - eleven pages. We don't know what is in it - except that it has to do with Soviet American relations.

The President received it at the Colorado ranch, where he's on

~~However,~~ There may be a sign of what Bulganin has to say - a sign in the doings of Secretary of State John Foster Dulles. We hear that he ~~had~~ read the letter from the Soviet Premier - before he made his address at the U N today. So the tenor of what he had to say may reflect - the tone of the Bulganin letter.

The Dulles declaration at the U N - was ~~in~~ wild and thoughtful. He said - the West is ready to offer Moscow an over-all plan of European security. In return for Soviet agreement - on a unified Germany.

He suggested - the time is ripe for a settlement

of various issues. All <sup>this</sup> ~~was~~ in the spirit of the Geneva meeting at the summit. The Secretary concluding with an appeal - to make the next ten years, what he called - "the healing decade of true peace."

Molotov joined in the applause. The Soviet Foreign Minister - hand-clapping his approval.

So now the assumption is that the American Secretary of State would not have made an address, friendly and conciliatory - unless the Bulganin letter to President Eisenhower were of a similar sort.

In London, today, Foreign Secretary MacMillan repeated a ~~sax~~ statement - which has caused an uproar over in England. He first uttered the objectionable words when he returned from the Geneva conference at the summit. Saying: "There ain't gonna be no war."

There was a storm of protest from one end of England to the other, and you might think the English were in favor of having a war. But that wasn't the reason. England, proper and correct, objected to the bad grammar and flippant slang.

All of which was taken up, today, by the Foreign Secretary, who said his remark was - apt, if inelegant. He said it was - true, if ungrammatical.

To emphasize this, he repeated the ~~shawk~~ shocking words all over again, saying more loudly than ever: "There ain't gonna be no war."

That old era of grim silence - has surely disappeared from Soviet Russia. The Taciturn tyranny - of Stalin. The big-shot of these days is a talkative character - Khrushchev, Who, today, simply poured out words - at a reception for a party of members of the French Parliament. A reception attended - by a throng of newsmen.

Khrushchev talked on a whole series of subjects - voluble, outspoken. For example, he stated - Soviet Far Eastern policy plainly.

He said - there were three conditions for a solution in the Far East. One - the admission of Red China to the United Nations. Two - the return of Formosa to Red China. Three - the liquidation of the Army of Chiang Kai Shek.

From all of which we may conclude - that a settlement of the Far Eastern crisis is a long way off.



## ESPIONAGE

On September twenty-ninth, Nineteen Fifty-two, General Walter Bedell Smith made a statement - that raised an uproar. In formal testimony, he said - he was morally certain that Communists had infiltrated virtually every security organization of the United States government. Including - the top secret Central Intelligence Agency. At that time, Bedell <sup>u</sup>Smith was - head of the C. I. A.

That sounded alarming, and he clarified by saying <sup>that</sup> he didn't know of any Red agents in the C I A. But <sup>that</sup> Communist espionage was clever - and would surely try to infiltrate the Chief Intelligence Department of the United States.

Well, Bedell Smith was more correct than he ever guessed. A few days previously, September Twenty-Seventh, Nineteen Fifty-Two, something had happened in Moscow - of which he could hardly have been aware.

That something is now disclosed - in Australia. Where a Royal Commission has just published a series of documents on Red espionage. The Petrov case - material provided by Vladimir

Petrov, who was head of the Russian espionage outfit in Australia. And who - deserted Communism in Nineteen Fifty Four, going over to freedom.

One of these documents is a set of instructions dispatched by Moscow to its own spy chiefs in the free world. The order lists various types of information to be produced - one - as follows: Data concerning tasks <sup>assigned</sup> ~~set~~ by American Intelligence organizations to their secret sections and agents abroad.


( Another order says: "Take measures for the recruitment of valuable agents who have access to enemy intelligence and counter-intelligence organizations." )

The Moscow directive concerning American Intelligence was issued two days before General Bedell Smith, Chief of American Intelligence, ~~gxx~~ gave his testimony in Washington.

## MCCARTHY

Senator McCarthy writes a letter to President Eisenhower. Which is the ~~aa~~ more interesting - because of the vitriolic attacks the Wisconsin Senator has been making against the President. Calling him - an appeaser of Soviet Russia.

The letter, however, has to do with matters of internal Communism - the government loyalty security program.

(~~McCarthy urging - that the President should make a personal defense of the administration methods for protecting the government against Red infiltration.~~) The Senator says there  a left wing attack, which might ~~aa~~ make people believe that the loyalty investigations are "arbitrary, brutal and unintelligent."

So he thinks the President should take the lead in correcting this misrepresentation. (McCarthy urging - a major address by President Eisenhower.

The tone of the letter is - perhaps -- the most

interesting part of it. Cordial, friendly - after those anti-Eisenhower diatribes hurled by McCarthy.

# ARGENTINA

The new provisional President of Argentina issued orders today. General Lonardi, at Cordoba, addressing the nation,

~~He~~ proclaimed - the dissolution of the Argentine Congress. Which was - the only reasonable thing to do.

When Peron quit, the entire Peron majority - quit along with him. Only the opposition minority was left; - ~~on~~ twelve *of them!*

It was a sign of the times that the Argentine Congress consisted, almost altogether - of the followers of Peron. Only a mere dozen - in opposition to the dictator.

~~So the National Legislature could hardly do business with a membership of~~ *only* *So it is* ~~twelve. Now dissolved - with an Army junta running the country.~~

~~Provisional President Lonardi also announced - full political freedom. Political liberty, - guaranteed!~~

~~Tonight~~ Tonight, we finally ~~have some clear idea of~~  
*about Peron himself.*  
~~the personal situation of Peron.~~ As we've been hearing, he's

aboard a Paraguayan gunboat in the harbour of Buenos Aires. Now the word is - that the gunboat is in a dismantles condition. The vessel having been at Buenos Aires for repairs, when Peron was overthrown. So he's a refugee aboard a dismantled warship - which nevertheless does have the status of Paraguayan territory.

Today's dispatch states that another Paraguayan gunboat is on its way down river from Assuncion, heading for the Rio de la Plata - making a fast voyage to pick up Peron. While the Paraguayan Ambassador at Buenos Aires today, asked the new government to let Peron leave - grant him a guarentee of safe passage aboard the other gunboat which is coming to take the fallen dictator upstream to ~~Rax~~ Paraguay.

The new regime so far has made no reply to this request for safe passage for the ex-dictator. Putting it off until Provisional President Lonardi arrives at Buenos Aires tomorrow. Today he was detained at Cordoba - by popular celebrations - celebrating the overthrow of Peron.



In his radio declaration from Cordoba, today, *Gen.*

Lonardi announced - a change of name for two ~~ARE~~ Argentine

provinces. One - President Peron Province, ~~also~~ named after

*Fallen*  
the "strong man." The other, the Eva Peron Province, named

after the late Evita, the wife so prominent in the rise of

Peron. The two provinces <sup>*to*</sup> ~~are~~ ~~getting~~ back their former names -

"Chaco" and "La Palma."

## ARGENTINA - CRUISER

One aftermath of the Argentine revolution is this  
- the Seventeenth of October becomes the Sixteenth of June.

The one time "phoenix" changing its name.

(~~Which may sound puzzling, until we note - that Latin American countries have a way of using memorable dates, as names for things. In this case - a warship, a cruiser.~~)

A few years ago, our government sold Argentina - the light cruiser "Phoenix". We name our cruisers after cities - like Phoenix, Arizona. Peron renamed the warship - after a big Peron Day. The one in Nineteen Forty-five when the "strong man" was overthrown by an Army Coup d'etat, and

<sup>when</sup> ~~But~~ labor mobs came to Peron's defense, ~~and he was restoring him~~ to power.

For ten years, the cruiser celebrated that Peron ~~Trium~~ <sup>with</sup> triumph. But now the dictator ~~is~~ out, and Argentinians are hailing that anti-Peron event back in the summer - the Navy revolt, which failed. So the ~~Seventeenth-of-October~~ becomes the ~~Sixteenth-of-June~~.

Today, Buenos Aires was quiet - with the exception of one turbulent scene. When - a crowd ransacked the headquarters of the Peron political party;

Once - the all-powerful faction. They hurled the furniture out the windows, and used it for bonfires in the street.

At the same time, the newspaper, La Prensa, was invaded. Old ~~employees~~ employees, who had been ousted by Peron, ~~we~~ took over the building. "La Prensa" on its way back to its former state, as an independent ~~newspaper~~ newspaper. *Some* ten thousand students went swarming into the newspaper shop - in a cheering demonstration.
