From near and far - from the humblest of slums, from magnificent castles - they came by the thousands today. Kings and commoners - generals and ex-G 1's - blacks, and whites - young and old - paying their final respects to General Eisenhower; as he lay in state - at the Capitol Rotunda.

By early afternoon - the line of mourners stretched the equivalent of half a dozen city blocks - four abreast. It was bone chilling cold - yet none complained. And the visits of the mighty - were intersperced easily in the midst of the steady procession.

President de Gaulle of France was one of

the first - arriving last night to salute his old comradein arms. Since then - a host of world leaders; a

gathering of exples unmatched in Washington - since the

1963 funeral of John F. Kennedy. The list including besides de Gaulle: Kings Baudouin of Belgium - the Shide

Prime Minister Trudeau of Canada - Lord Louis

Mountbatten, representing Queen Elizabeth - Chancellor

Kiesinger of West Germany and a lost of the

Former Pres. and Wro. Toknow had

flown in from Texas; former V. P.

and Wro. Humphey from Minesta;

members of the Sup. Court, the

Senate and the House; wang growing

also personal friends of the

general and Wro. Essen

Finally, the Rotunda was closed off - at two thirty-five this afternoon; an hour later than originally scheduled - to accommodate the many who were still waiting outside. And then - a last private visit from family and friends.

As ever - Mrs. Eisenhower remaining her composure - fighting back the tears. Thirteen year old Mary Jean Eisenhower saying of her grandmother:

"She's doing very well" she's a strong lady - I'm proud of her."

Later, at Washington National Cathedral - a simple Protestant service; with eulogies willtary pageantry - as specified by the General himself prior to his death.

Nevertheless - a compelling, moving ceremony. Including a prayer by the Reverend Elson of the National Presbyterian Church - which read in part: "Oh eternal Father - suffer us not to miss the glory of this hour; give us eyes to see and hearts to feel - the undaunted courage, invincible faith, the unconquerable love of thy servant, Dwight David; that we may be as true as he was true - loyal as he was loyal; that we may henceforth - be good enough and great enough for our times."

And at the end - Episcopal Bishop William

Creighton sounding the traditional Benediction - saying:

"Unto God's gracious mercy and protection - we commit

Dwight David. The Lord bless him and keep him. The

Lord make his face to shine upon him - and be gracious unto him. The Lord lift up his countenance upon him - and give him peace, both now and ever more. Amen."

EN ROUTE TO ABILENE

To the strains of "Onward Christian

Soldiers" - the General's final journey was then began.

His body placed aboard a train - bound tonight for Abilene;

gentle and kind man" called Ike.

And so - Dwight David Einenhower passes
into history. But the legacy he leaves behind - will long
enrich the lives of every American.

He was, of course, first and foremost a great General - Supreme Commander of the greatest fighting force ever assembled by man. And for that - the free world will remain forever in his debt.

His record as President - while less dramatic perhaps - Legually impressive. Indeed, the deep once asked to list his proudest achievements as President - and he quickly "dashed off" - as he put it - twenty-three momentus accomplishments.

Among them: Statehood for Alaska and Hawaii

the building of the St. Lawrence Seaway - the end of the

Korean War - the largest tax reduction ever - the first

Civil Rights law in eighty years - the start of the U S

space program - a vast network of federal highways - the

start of federal medical care for the aged - the desegregation of Washington, D. C., as well the armed forces - the enforcement of Federal Court orders at Little Rock with no loss of life - establishment of the Department of Health, Education and Welfare - the Alliance for Progress - the Atoms for Peace Plan - and so on and so on - the list is almost endless.

One thing more though: he was also the first

President in history to insist - in his own words - on the

"preservation of an adequate military establishment after

cessation of war." And that - coupled with his wisdom and

determination in foreign affairs - was surely the difference

between peace and war, time and time again.

Dwight David Eisenhower truly "a man for all seasons."

As we pay our final respects to General

Eisenhower - it is perhaps well that we ask ourselves each of us: "What can I do - to further the ideals for
which he stood? How can I advance the cause - for which,
in a very real sense, he gave the last full measure of
devotion."

The answer to that - each of us must fathom

from the depths of his own mind, his heart, his soul.

It might be a start though to try to live our personal

lives - as Ike lived his - as he recalled in his last

words. General Eisenhower telling his beloved Mamie:

"I have always loved my wife - I have always loved my

children - I have always loved my grandchildren - I have

always loved my country."

As President Nixon said: "That was Dwight

Eisenhower."

And now-Wavren Moran - as I
