Here's a story that sounds like ancient history, since it has to do with the West Virginia primary, Kennedy versus Humphrey.

There were charges of - irregularities in that primary election; vote-buying - ballot-box stuffing - and so on. But today the Justice Department stated that it hasn't been able to find that any Federal laws were violated. The election on the up and up - as far as Uncle Sam is concerned; the West Virginia primary - where the Kennedy band wagon really started to roll.

As expected, the Democratic platform has touched off - a heated debate inside the party. All because of that one plank always controversial - the Civil Rights plank.

The Democratic statement on civil rights this time
- asks equality for all Americans - everywhere in the
country. The plank, suggesting - wide federal action
against segregation, includes the phrase Tom Paine made
familiar - during the revolution; the historic phrase "The Aights Of Lan". The Democrats feeling - so far as
their platform goes - that civil rights mean nothing more
nor less than - "The Rights of Man".

The chairman of the platform committee actually predicts that any Democratic candidate will stand squarely on this civil rights plank. Chester bowles, mentioning specifically - Senator Kennedy, who seems to have the nomination sewed up.

Some southerners, because of this, already are threatening to bolt the party in November.

The United States today called Nikita Khrushchev

American bases in Britain. Prime minister MacMillan - rejecting this. But admitting that he wants to discuss the whole question of American bases with President Eisenhower.

Later word - a top American note dispatched to

Moscow. Warning that the consequences will be serious 
if Russia shoots down any more of our planes over

international waters.

Today's appeal from the Congo republic - shows how desperate things are in that new African state.

Premier Lumumba, asking America - to send three thousand troops. Do it - quickly. Our government, passing the request along - to the United Nations. We, willing to do this but only under the auspices of the U. N.

Dag Hammarskjold has thanked America for a vote of confidence - in the U. N. The Secretary General is drawing up plans - to go to the Congo; and see for himself whether murder and maynem are still the order of the day. Meanwhile the word is that more provinces are refusing to obey Leopoldville. The Congo - lurching toward disintegration.

The Credentials Committee handled a ticklish situation today - a split in the Puerto Rican delegation. The seven members - dividing into two factions. So what did the Credentials Committee do? It ruled that both factions be seated - with three and half votes for each. A solomonic judgement - in Los Angeles.

What about a chairman - for the Puerto Aican delegation? The Credentials Committee ducked that one. At the moment there's a rivalry for that - Orlando Antosanti versus Jose Benitez.

Says Antosanti - "If Benitez grabs the microphone
- our group will demand to be polled." Antosanti claiming
they have the Puerto Rican vote nailed down four to three.

Adding that their majority will become clear to the
convention - after they have been polled. Who are they
for?

Oh all seven Puerto mican delegates say they are for Kennedy.
