The mystery of what happened to the aged Iranian Premier, who fled, is solved. He was caught. Mossadegh is now under house arrest - waiting to stand trial as a traitor. The ex-Premier was captured by a trick.

Yesterday he fled from his home as the mob
swept down upon it. In the confusion Mossadegh
disappeared. But General Zahe di's detectives found
a telephone number that puzzled them. And one of them
phoned, pretending to be one of Mossadegh's servants.
And that was how they found him. That chance prophone
number. A house nearby to which he had hurriedly
fled, across housetops.

When the police broke in upon him the old man wax was waiting, apparently not too surprised that he was trapped.

When told he was under arrest, he asked to be allowed to stay indoors, until sunset -- so he wouldn't be seen by the mobs, and torn to bits as had happened to some of his associates.

At dusk the man police took him to face General Zanedi, the new premier appointed by the Shah. Zahedi charged Mossadegh with disobeying the orders of his King - rebelling man against the government. General Zahedi then stated that the Shah who quote "has the kindest heart has ordered that not a hair of your head be harmed until you have been fully tried". So that's what the bed-ridden, weeping ex-Premier has to look forward to - a trial for treason.

With Mossadegh's capture, his followers are being rounded up. Offically, the death list is put at seventy-three - but correspondents say it's nearer to three hundred. At Rm Abadan, near the Anglo-Iranian oil refinery, eight were killed.

General Zahedi has ordered the Army to shoot

if necessary to maintain order. The new head of the

Persian government has set up headquarters at the

Teheran Officers' Club, and is forming a cabinet.

He warns against Communist infiltration, and is taking

special precautions against the Reds moving in.

According to the Teheran radio, the capital city is now calm. There are reports that "saboteurs" infiltrated the army in one province - but were captured after some of them were killed.

The largest group of American prisoners, on their way home. A hundred and fifty, passed thru Freedom

Village today. Allied officials say there will be more

SUB STRIKE

The French strike is over. The chief mediator reveals an agreement between the Laniel government and the Socialist and Catholic unions. The strike, more than two weeks old. It began when the Socialists walked out. And very shortly two million workers were idle.

The situation became so critical, that there were plans to recall the French Parliament. It was feared that this would cause the downfall of Premier Laniel. But now, the agreement is announced. And it appears that nospecial session of the National Assembly will be necessary. The Premier narrowly escaping a vote of confidence - the type of vote that has proved fatal to so many of his predecessors.

SEGREGATION

The Navy moves to end segragation among civilian employees. Secretary Anderson calling for "complete elimination" of the old system in the south. Until now, Navy practice has been to go along with local conditions. In the South, that meant separate facilities like drinking fountains and restaurants.

The change of policy is described as coming from the White House. President Eisenhower, fulfilling his campaign pledge to eliminate segregation in all federal installations.

Secretary Anderson has dispatched orders to

development "toward the complete elimination of all

barriers to the free use of facilities of government

owned shore stations." The Secretary wants the new

policy be begun right away. And he orders commanding

officers to report on progress every sixty days.)

Edward Rothschild stole classified material from the government printing office. So stated by Miss Cleta Guess, who was his assistant.

Miss Guess testified before the McCarthy
Sub-Committee. The testimony secret, but a transcript
was read afterward by McCarthy!s counsel, Roy Cohn.

Rothschild has already refused to tell the subcommittee xx whether he is a Communist, or whether
he has ever stolen secret government documents. Now
Miss Guess declares that she saw him take certain
classified material. She told the sub-committee: "I
saw him on a few occasions put a pamphlet in his right
pocket." Then she added: "He used to keep the Daily
Worker in his left pocket."

Miss Guess was asked whether she ever saw

Rothschild take any document on which he was not

working himself. And she replied: "Oh yes, the secret

code for the U S Merchant Marine."

Miss Guess testified that she worked with the F B I. On one occasion she saw Rothschild take, what



she terms, "a long, thin book." She took a duplicate of the book, and turned it over to the F B I.

Miss Guess revealed incredibly bad security
measures at the printing office. She noted that it
was possible to take almost any document. As she puts
it: "They never looked at your purse. As long as you
had identification - you could take anything out."

The statement about bad security measures is supported by Senator Potter of Michigan. He calls the printing office "a virtual bank of secret and classified information, and yet the security precautions are - insufficient and inefficient."

He adds that a man with a vest pocket camera might be able to take pictures of secret documents. All of which, points up those McCarthy charges is about laxity in protecting classified material in Washington.

Adlai Stevenson teturns from his tour around the world. The leader of the Democratic Party was away six months - on a fact-finding trip through the Far East and Europe.

His main impression abroad, was that American prestige has declined - but he isn't at all pessimistic about it. Among the causes, Stevenson mentioned the cut in our defense build-up, a tendency to what he called "no aid and no trade." book-burning, and the invasion of executive responsibility.

However, he declared that the impression concerns only details. Says Adlai: "In its broad outlines, the image of a magnanimous America still stands, clear and radiant."

Adlai was asked about the developments in Iran.

He refused to comment, but he and did produce one

of his famous quips. Remarking on the flight of

Dr. Mossadegh, Adlai suggested: "Maybe there's room

for an ambitious politician."
