Senator Henry Jackson says that - in his opinion if the House and Senate cannot reach a verdict on the impeachment question by January Third - then the entire impeachment proceedings should begin all over again. He says he doesn't think there's any question but that the entire process - including the preliminary House investigation would have to begin again if a verdict is still undecided when a new congress - the Ninety-Fourth - convenes in January. Some Senators however, disagree with Jackson's view - contending that Congress is a continuing body and the process could go forward. However, newly elected Senators and Congressmen presumably would face the

prospect of voting without having heard all the evidence.

Two Democratic economists say they don't agree with President Nixon's approach to the problem of inflation.
