ECONOMY

Two Democratic economists say they don't
agree with President Nixon's approach to the problem
of inflation. Walter Heller and James Dusenberry who served in the Kennedy and Johnson Administrations claim there is no way to stop inflation this yearno "quick fix" as Heller put it in testimony before a Congressional Committee.
