Or, on the question of how the country feels -- about Dwight D. Eisenhower. When the question of his eye-lash victory at the polls came up - the President Elect denied it would diminish his mandate from the people. In his words - "the margin was narrow, but the responsibility is clear." Then John Kennedy added -- that this election is no repudiation of any person or any party. He considers it - simply a victory for the Democrats. By a norrow Margin.

ELECTION

Well, tonight it's still not clear just who won the popular vote - with the final on California and Alaska uncertain. Tonight there appears to be a chance that more Americans voted for Nixon than for Kennedy. Only about three hundred thousand votes separate the two candidates out of a total of sixty-six million. And it is conceivable that late returns will show - an absolute majority for Nixon. In fact, Nixon himself predicts that absentee ballots - will in the end give him, his home state, California.

What effect could all this have? None - probably. But some Republicans claim there is a vague outside chance - of Nixon coming out on top in electoral votes that a recount in several close states could change the verdict.

However the Kennedy victory seems to be almost a mathematical certainty.

ALGERIA

The French in Algeria are closer to Civil War - following those violent demonstrations. An angry crowd gathered at the war memorial in Algiers - to protest the against DeGaulle plan for an "Algerian Algeria". Three thousand right wing settlers - shouted "Algeria is French!" And, defied orders - to disperse.

When they refused to break up - DeGaulle's riot police charged in a flying wedge. Swinging batons they forced the mob out of the square. The legitimate authorities claim to have Algeria under control - for the moment. But they are not making any prediction, about tomorrow - Armistice Day, when the rightists traditionally demonstrate in favor of a French Algeria.

The situation is so dangerous that DeGaulle has ordered his Defense Minister to Algiers - to forestall a me possible army revolt. The President of France is demanding a pledge of loyalty - from every member of his ALGERIA - 2

The latest is that DeGaulle himself may fly to Algiers - for a first hand investigation. Here caught between right and left - between the French settlers Res m aand the Moslem rebels, A tough structure - for a moderate who wants to put through a program following the middle of the road Program. CONGO

Two members of the patrol escaped into the jungle, where they were later picked up by a helicopter - and flown to Leopoldville. Their experience so harrowing - they are exactly still to dazed to explain what happened. But they do say that they were ambushed - by the fierce Baluba who are tribesmen, now in open revolt. Nine members of the patrol were overwhelmed - in the worst Congo atrocity involving the U N.

MISSILE
