INTEGRATION

James Meredith, the negro student at the Universith of Mississippi - is losing his army escort.

So the soldiers - all that remain - of the thirty thousand strong, who moved in last fall to quell the moting over Meredith's admission - are breaking camp.

How does Meredith feel about it? He says the army knows best.

DAMASCUS

Syria is so displeased with Nasser of Egypt since last week's unsuccessful revolt in Damascus - that it may now seek Union with Iraq. So says Doctor Sami al Jundi, Syria's Minister of information, who today told newsmen that Nasser has, as he put it :- "retreated from Arab unity".

The Syrians blame last week's revolt on Nasser. From Egypt Nasser is accusing Syria of being - one big concentration camp. Also of trying to blow up his plan for a Syrian-Iraqi- Egyptian Federation.

Reports tonight say that shooting has broken out again - in Damascus, and that the Syrian Air force with Soviet MIG jets is patrolling the skies over the city.

KOREA

The longest truce in the history is being celebrated on its thirteenth anniversary today - by the United Nations Command in Korea.

Some are beginning to wonder how much longer the command there will hold together. Only three countries of the original sixteen - still have troops in Korea: - Thailand, Turkey and the U.S.A. - with Thailand and Turkey - anxious to pull out.

PORTUGAL

In the U.N. today, Portugal's Foreign
Minister Alberto Nogueira replied to the charges of Tunisia, Liberia, Sierra Leone and Madagascar, the
African nations that are asking Portugal to get out
of Africa.

For Minister Nogueira is inviting them all to come to Portuguese Africa, and see for themselves what conditions are like. He says :- Portugal has
nothing to hide!

EARHART

This was another exciting day in the history of stamps and it has to do with a bit of aviation history. The stamp? To commemorate the sixty-fifth birthday of Amelia Earhart. What would have been her sixty-fifth birthday - if she hadn't been lost in the Pacific, along with navigator Fred Noonan. That was back in nineteen thirty-seven. This unusual girl - who was a friend of mine - - I am sure she would be pleased the Amelia Earhart stamps were put into circulation today - by the ninety-niners, the licensed Lady Pilots of A merica. These hi-flying gals taking off from Atchison, Kansas for Post Offices around the country. Atchison - where the lovely and adventuresome Amelia Earhart was born sixty-five years ago today.
