The hurricane tonight has started moving again, proceeding slowly toward the coast.

A great naval campaign is on - in the Pacific.

A fleet of a hundred ships - in systematic maneuvers, all the way from California to Japan. But no guns are thundering - it's all scientific.

The United States, Canada and Japan - in a systematic investigation of the mysteries of the North Pacific. Studying - winds, tides and currents Depths, temperatures - and distribution of Marine plants and fish. Important - in problems of oceanography, weather forecasting, and the fishing industry. They might even discover - submerged oil resources.

There's special emphasis - on the currents of the North Pacific. Which pose - curious problems.

Three years ago, for example, an empty whiskey bottle was dropped in the ocean, off the California coast. In February it was picked up on the shores of Saipan. That island - off the south coast of China. Carried by the currents all the way across the Pacific - some five thousand miles.

So the great international fleet is now studying problems of oceanography - including the problem of the whiskey bottle that brifted 5000 miles.

At the "Atoms for Peace" Conference in Geneva, there was warning, today, against - "runaways." Meaning - deadly radiation, let loose by accidents in atomic reactors.

A dramatic paper - presented by Dr. Edward Teller, of the University of California, who did so much in the development of the hydrogen bomb. Dr. Teller called - the "Father of the H-bomb."

He said - it might be necessary to evacuate a large city, or abandon a great area of the countryside. If - there was a "runaway" of radiation at an atomic plant.

of course, all safety measures, ake to avoid accidents - are adopted. But the report gives a warning in the following eloquent words - "there is no fool-proof system.

Any system can be defeated by a great enough fool."

A highly dramatic story has developed - at the court martial of Sergeant James Gallagher. Accused - of having murdered fellow American captives, and of having collaborated with the enemy. While - he was a prisoner of war in North Korea.

Various witnesses have been giving evidence of what went on in the red prison camp. So now the story - how Private Cletus Nordin of Tulsa, Oklahoma, pretended collaboration with Communism. Doing spy work - for a secret anti-Communist group, among the prisoners.

It all began when the Reds told him - they had a couple of letters for him from his wife. They'd give him the letters - if he would come over to Communism. The prisoner knew that his wife, back home, had undergone an operation.

And the letters - would inform him of the outcome.

An agonizing problem for Private Nordin - who went for advice to a Sergeant among the prisoners, Lloyd Pate of

Augusta, Georgia. Telling him - of the bitter dilemma. Pate advised him to go ahead, and "play ball", so as to get - the letters from kin his wife. Which Nordin did.

The catch was - that Sergeant Pate was running an anti-Communist espionage outfit. A sort of miniature G-2 keeping the patriotic prisoners informed of the doings of the so-called "Progressives", prisoners collaborating with the Reds. He told Nordin to stay on - among the "Progressives" and work for Pate's anti-Communist organization.

So Nordin served as a spy for the miniature G-2 until the time the captives were liberated.

At the court-martial today, Colonel Ivan Parr, a member of the court, asked Nordin if the Chinese Reds knew he was transmitting information to Sergeant Pate?

"No sir," replied the soldier. "I wouldn't be here today, if they knew it."

Southern Viet Nam has rejected a demand made by

Premier Diem says - that his government had no part in the truce negotiations. So, therefore, he is not bound by the treaty. His reply to the Communists is - that he won't negotiate for an election, until northern Viet Nam is - free. Obviously, his point is - that free elections are impossible with half the country under Communism.

New threats of trouble - at the Island of Wolmi.

Where - the U S Army has beaten off attacks by mobs. Wolmi - the place where Communist members of the Korean armistice commission are stationed. South Korean rioters - wanting to get at them.

Today's word is that South Korean war veterans have mobilized near Wolmi - for another attack. Threatening new disorders - like the trouble we we have heard about last night.

The American command is losing patience. The belief being - that the South Korean government has incited the demonstrations against the Communist members of the truce commission. Syngman Rhee to be told - the U S Army will "get through" if the disorders are not halted immediately. The G I's - to use bullets, instead of tear gas and fire hoses.
