Good Evening Everybody -

At the top of the news tonight - the President's just completed economic address. The President rejecting the use of "shock treatment" - as a means of fighting inflation. Saying that wage price controls or tax cut - "would be like pouring gasoline on a raging fire." Further noting that such steps, while they might provide "short term relief - too often bring long term grief."

The answer then - the President went on - lies in choosing a sensible, realistic course - and sticking to it, whatever the pressures." "And that" - said he - "is exactly what we will do." As a first step, ordering a cut of fourty thousand in federal jobs - through attrition; along with a cut of five billion - in federal spending. "We are on the road toward our goal of full prosperity - without war and without inflation" - said he. Adding: "We're going to stay on that road."

~~Back~~ In Washington - the House Judiciary Committee *today*
was continuing ~~today~~ ^{the} its dramatic impeachment debate.

One by one the committee members spelling out their individual views of what it was the President did or did not do; and how they themselves - should now respond.

One of the most telling presentations - that of Congressman Butler of Virginia - a Republican - once a strong Nixon supporter - who charged the President with an "abuse of power fully without justification." Adding that "Watergate is our shame" - and must lead to impeachment.

From the Western White House - speedy reaction.

Communications Director Ken Clawson saying: "The television cameras showed much anguish - but none, it seemed for factual evidence." Clawson further demanding: "Where is the evidence?"

Jaworski

Special Prosecutor Leon Jaworski - was back in court today; attempting to speed up the release - of ~~them~~² additional White House tapes. Jaworski urging the start of delivery - within two days. Judge Sirica immediately ordering a full hearing - as of tomorrow morning.

Supreme Court

The Supreme Court today rendered its second historic decision - in as many days. ^{This time} By a vote of five to four - banning the forced busing of school ^{children} ~~bussing~~ across city and county lines - except in compelling circumstances.

~~Same as yesterday~~ - The majority opinion written by Chief Justice Warren Burger. "No single tradition in public education is more deeply rooted" - said he - "than local control over the operation of schools." Burger adding that "local autonomy" is "essential - both for the maintenance of community concern and support - and for the quality of the educational process."

GENEVA

Turkish Foreign Minister Turam Gunes ^{was} the first to arrive at Geneva today for the start of three-power talks on Cyprus. ^{The Istanbul} ~~Gunes~~ ^{For-Min.} promptly demanding the establishment - of an independent, sovereign Republic of Cyprus; a new nation - with a Greek Cypriot President but a Turkish Cypriot Vice President; ~~and~~ both to share equally - in the administration of the Cypriot government. Only then - said he - can the Greeks and Turks on Cyprus - live together "in peace, cooperation and fraternity."


Next to arrive - British Foreign Secretary James Callaghan. Saying the parley's first job - is that of shoring up the present cease fire; with political problems ^{to be} ~~and~~ left for later. Callaghan's assessment - later echoed by Greek Foreign Minister George Mabros, ^e who said the cease fire on Cyprus is still "being violated - everyday, every moment."

The Hague

The International Court of Justice at the Hague ruled today that Iceland was wrong - in unilaterally extending its fishing limits to fifty miles at sea. This - in response to a British complaint. The court adding that Britian and Iceland are now mutually obliged to negotiate a new fishing agreement in good faith.

Belfast

In Northern Ireland - IRA terrorists today claimed responsibility - for planting that unprimed bomb yesterday in a British Airways jet. An IRA spokesman saying: "We did not intend the charge to go off - but merely to demonstrate that we can breach airport security anytime we choose." Adding, "however: "Future bombs - will be set to explode."
