High over the Florida Keys -- today a Cuban exile tried to hijack an American airliner; in an apparent attempt to force the pilot to fly to Cuba. Did he hope to pick up some others.

those At any rate, the alleged hijacker -- identified as

Luis Medina Perez; who tried to reach Cuba by boat last week -- but was turned back when his engine failed. Perez was subdued by fellow passengers in today's try -- and turned over to police when the planearrived at Key West.

The Florida Straits were so rough today that U.S.

Coast Guard cutters moved to within ten miles of the Cuban coast, to form a chain of stepping stones -- for small boats leavingCamarioca -- and they did rescue twenty-six refugees from one small craft -- just before it sank.

In Viet Nam -- a detachment of American "Flying

Horsemen" -- today joined the battle at Plei Me. Fighting men

of the First Cavalry -- arriving by air, To join the beleaguered

garrison of that U.S. Special Forces camp -- under Communist

siege for the past week.

The Reds' reply — another suicide charge, That carried towithin twenty yards of the camp's barbed-wire defenses -- before the attackers were cut down in a hail of fire. A force of government troops later leaving the camp -- to engage the Communists in the open field.

Meanwhile, a second Communist attack today -- on another U.S. Special Forces camp, At Min Thanh -- about fifty wiles northwest of Saigon. But so far -- little damage. U.S. jet aircraft -- helping to keep the Communists at bay.

From Denver -- news today of a special project,
To protest the recent protests -- against U.S. policy in Viet
Nam.

Some thirty students from the University of Colorado
-- will travel tomorrow to the Pitzsimmons Army Hospital, To
give a pint of blood apiece -- for our men in Viet Nam.

They call it -- a "bleed-in."

The exiled Dalai Lama held a rare news conference today -- at his Indian retreat. in New Bolki. Purpose -- an appeal to the United Nations -- for support of Tibet's right to freedom, In the face of what he called -- Communist China's "systematic extermination of the peaceful people of Tibet."

"Throughout our history -- we have never known

famine" -- said the Dalai Lama. "But now" -- he went on -
"Tibetans are living on meager rations and dying in the

hundreds -- because of exhaustion and fatigue." The problem

aggravated -- said he -- by the influx of Chinese -- who now

"outnumber the local population."

The Dalai Lama adding that if necessary -- he will carry his case personally -- to the United Nations.

The Texas White House today announced that President Johnson had signed into law -- the Two Billion Dollar Rivers and Harbors Bill, Finally enacted in the closing days -- of the Eighty-Winth Congress.

But the President said to have no intention -- of obeying a major provision of the bill. One that would grant veto powers to the Senate and House Public Works Committees waterpower -- over projects costing Ten Million Dollars or less.

The President quoted as saying: -- "I do not intend to accept this infringement upon the office of the presidency."

Purther -- "the people of this country did not elect me to this office -- to preside over its erosion."

As it later turned out -- the announcement X a bit premature, gince the bill had not yet left Washington. At any rate, the President's intentions -- perfectly clear.

In Atlanta -- Dr. Martin Luther King today promised a massive Civil Rights drive -- over the next few months, To force passage of a law -- making it a Federal crime to kill a Civil Rights worker.

The drive to get under way as early as November -said he. With the focus of the movement -- on Haynesville,
Alabama, where two men were acquitted in Civil Rights slayings
-- in the last few weeks.

At North Nashville, Tennessee -- an eleven-year-old polic victim died today in an iron lung -- from which the power had been disconnected. The boy's exhausted mother apparently falling asleep -- while attempting to operate the iron lung by hand.

Friday, According to the mother -- because of non-payment of a bill. The local electric company emphasizing, however, that it was unaware -- of the boy's plight.

British Prime Minister Harold Wilson today began the first of a series of showdown talks -- with Rhodesian Premier Ian Smith. On how best to grant Rhodesia its independence -- without precipitating an international crisis.

An hour later -- Wilson sent an urgent summons to British Attorney-General Sir Elwyn Jones, Who is expected to arrive in Salisbury -- sometime tomorrow.

Jones' mission -- reportedly to advise on the

Rhodesian offer of a solemn treaty, Suaranteeing the advancement

of Black Africans -- as provided in the Colony's Constitution

of Nineteen Sixty-One.

INDONESIA

Thousands of demonstrators -- paraded through the streets of Jakarta today, Demanding an end to Red China's interference -- in Indonesian affairs. Also accusing President Sukarno's top aide -- of so-called anti-American slander, And demanding dissolution -- of the Indonesian Communist Party.

A tragic accident reported today -- from the town of Skwierzyna in western Poland. A bus crowded with English travelers of Polish ancestry -- headed for home when it crashed with a truck in dense fog. The bus skidding crazily -- as it hurtled onward onto a nearby bridge. Finally crashing through a guard rail -- and plunging into the Obra River.

Of the forty-nine persons aboard the bus -- thirteen killed instantly. Two more -- critically injured.
