The fourth day of that New Year's truce in Viet

Nam -- just getting underway tonight. With American

military officials fully convinced - it has already lasted

three days too long.

The reason -- to begin with: Nearly two hundred

Viet Cong truce violations so far - and probably many more

— out again
to come. But even worse - a massive so Communist effort to

build up supplies in the South -- under cover of the

cease-fire.

US scout planes and ships - forced to watch helplessly; in the face of enemy shipments - now estimated at thirty-five thousand tons of war materials. Enough food, clothing and weapons - to supply an entire enemy jungle division for a full year.

The build-up making it virtually certain - there will be no extension of the current truce. Indeed,

American officials predicting an all-out resumption of bombing - as of tomorrow night; in an effort to close off once again - the vital Viet Cong lifeline to the North.

In London - a fourth and final round of talks today;
between British Prime Minister Harold Wilson -- and
visiting Soviet Premier Alansi Kosygin. Apparently
ending up - right back was where they started; in a tight
deadlock - over possible means of securing peace in
Viet Nam.

Kosygin reportedly insisting, as he has all along, that Hanoi will talk peace - only if the United States calls an an unconditional halt - to its bombing of North Viet Nam. However, Kosygin reportedly refusing to ask Hanoi - for any reciprocal "sign of good faith," In the absence of which -- the United States refuses to stop its bombing.

And So - another stalemate.

Here at home - Arthur Goldberg is the latest U S official -- to challenge so-called Ppeace feelers" from
North Viet Nam. The U S Ambassador to the United Nations
-- telling Hanoi to clear up its "ambiguities" - if it's
really sincere about seeking peace.

As for the United States - "we remain prepared to go to the conference table - as soon as, and wherever, our adversaries are prepared to join us" - said Goldberg.

He added, however, that "the first essential prerequisite" to peace - is the will to strive for peace. "Not by unconditional surrender or by the dictation of terms" -- said Goldberg -- "but through a process of mutual accommodation."

Latest from Peking -- another smokescreen of disjointed reports today, serving only to confuse China-watchers A trying to gauge the progress of the current Red power struggle.

For example, one report has the army ordering seizure of all domestic airlines -- supposedly "to prepare for war." But what was - nobody knows. A second report - that Chinese Defense Minister Lin Paro has ordered all army personnel -- to discontinue their efforts in behalf of the "cultural revolution."

Meanwhile, Radio Peking is admitting that

Chairman Mao's purge of his opponents - has gone too far

too fast. Appealing to the Red Guards to slow down began

before they do irreparable harm to their country.

What it all means - we can only wait, and hope.
