Washington has pessimistic reports - on the danger of war between the State of Israel and the Arab countries. There are two angles - each increasingly ominous.

One - in the north of Palestine. The project - for irrigation development along the Jordan. The United States has been pressing this irrigation program - as a way to bring the Israeli and the Arabs together. Since the project would be - of mutual benefit to both.

Presidential Representative Eric Johnston has been out there, negotiating with both sides. Due home tomorrow - with his latest report. The signs - not hopeful. The Arabs - demanding more time. And the belief is - they hope to kill the irrigation plan - by delay.

The Israeli, on their side, are threatening to go ahead on their own - if the Arabs obstruct. They say - they'll divert water from the Jordan for irrigation. This they could do by building a canal. Which could be done - in a couple of weeks.

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The Jordan is the dividing line between Israel and the Arabs. The old story - of two parties being entitled to water from a river. So, if the Israeli should start diverting water from the Jordan - the Arabs in those parts might xxx respond with a shooting war.

The other angle - Egypt. With Egyptian purchase of armament - from Red Czechoslovakia. There had been hope - that the United States could talk the Egyptians out of this.

But now we hear - that the Cairo government has already made a down payment. Depositing two million, eight hundred and seventy thousand dollars in a Czechoslovak bank - as the first money for Communist weapons.

Tonight's Washington dispatch says there's fear that Israel might begin hostilities against Egypt - to get the jump on the Egyptians, before the Red armament is delivered.

Sill another focus of trouble - the Gulf of Aqaba.

Which is an arm of the Red Sea - leading to the Israeli port of Aqaba. ** Egyptians hold two small islands in the straits -

and have armed these with artillery. Blocking the waterway to Israeli vessels.

The government at Tel Aviv has threatened - to open the straits by force. Possibly - by commando raids or by bombing. Which, of course, could start a shooting war with Egypt.

A whole force of American diplomacy is being exerted to brevent an outbreak of war in the Middle East. But it looks
as if those plans might collapse - if the situation grows
worse.)

The news from the U.N., tonight, sounds like a report from a national convention - picking a presidential candidate.

In the General Assembly, six ballots were taken today and no decision was reached. The Philippines running against
Poland - then against Jugoslavia. No contender - able to get
a two-thirds majority. Which is necessary - for election to a
Council seat.

There's a vacancy on the Security Council - left by

Turkey. East and West - at odds about filling it. Soviet

Russia - proposing Communist Poland. Our side - backing the

Philippine republic.

The first ballot showed Poland - seventy-four. The Philippines - thirty-three. But, in subsequent ballots, the Philippines forged ahead - and looked like the winner.

Whereupon the Russians went into a strategic maneuver - dropping Poland. Switching - to Jugoslavia. Time was, when the Soviets and the Jugoslavs were bitter enemies - but that's different now.

On the next ballot, the Ihilippine total declined.

And the day ended - with the two contenders almost equal.

Whereupon there was an adjournment - for the purposes of "horse-trading", we are told.

In French Morocco, French troops are now trying to seal the border - of Spanish Morocco. Three columns, driving to cut in behind tribes in rebellion - and keep them from reaching the frontier.

The French have been charging that the Berber insurgents of the Riff have been getting aid - from Spanish Morocco. So they re trying to stop that. And also - encircle forces of rebels.

In Tokyo, today, crowds of Japanese took a look at "Honest John." So who is he? Well, he stands twenty-five feet
high, and is thirty inches in diameter. "Honest John" - being
the name the G.I's give the new artillery rocket. A giant
missile - capable of carrying an atomic warhead.

Today, however, "Honest John" had a cement head.

The Army - assuring the Japanese that they re in no danger of atomic explosions. The rockets - charged with a harmless weight of cement.

Military maneuvers planned - in which rockets will be used. The Japanese - apprehensive. Thinking: - rocket fire with atomic explosions. The Army, striving to assure them - nothing like that will happen.

Japan reports - a great volcanic eruption. A fire mountain - exploding with flaming lava and red hot stones.

In the realm of church music, a stern decree has been issued. Banning - a number of pieces, commonly played or sung at church services.

The news comes from the Roman Catholic Diocese of Chicago. The order issued - by Cardinal Stritch. The forbidden list includes - the two most popular wedding marches. The one by Wagner - "Here Comes the Bride." And the Mandelssohn wedding march - with its majestic opening chords.

So why are they banned? The order by Cardinal Stritch points out - that Warm Wagner's wedding march is from an opera, "Lohengrin". The Mendelssohn masterpiece - from "A Mid-Summer Night's Dream", music for a stage play, Shakespeare.

"Oh Promise Me" is also ruled out, because it's from an opera. Which one? "Robin Hood", by Reginald deKoven.

Obviously, the theory is - that theatrical music is not appropriate in a church. There being - plenty of church music more suitable.

But here's the surprise. Among the pieces of music

on the forbidden list, are the two best known versions of the "Ave Maria". Both the Schubert and the Gounod "Ave Maria".

So why should they be prohibited - in Catholic churches? The answer is - that they re more like secular songs than religious hymns.

The decision is based on one criterion. What it calls - "the essential quality of all sacred music. Namely, sanctity."

Well, this development in the Archdiocese of Chicago goes back to an old controversy. Many authorities holding - that church music should be of an austere, spiritual character. Like - the Gregorian chant, or the medieval style of cathedral singing. Not - in the worldly, or the romantic vein of later times.

PRINCESS

and cooperation in respecting her privacy."

Slightly ironical, Considering the lofty way the British press has been cooperating. With daily headlines and stampedes of reporters. All - to respect the privacy of Her Royal Highness.
