The Suez Committee, today, took time out - from negotiations with Egyptian President Nasser. The five man group wanting to consider, and among themselves, the Nasser plan for the Canal.

They re trying to find some sort of middle ground between the American suggestion - drawn up by Secretary of State John Poster Dulles. Which calls for the Suez waterway to be operated by an international commission. And the Nasser demand - that there be nothing more than an advisory board, connected with the U N. How to find a compromise between those two schemes - that's what the committee was debating today.

The next session will be - on Saturday. Not tomorrow because Friday is the Moslem Sabbath. The mant committee chairman, Prime Minister Menzies, happenen hopes to complete the dealings with Nasser on Saturday.

In London, Prime Minister Anthony Eden, today, called Parliament back from vacation- for a special session on

Wednesday. Topic - the Suez Canal. No further details are given, except for the mention - that, by Wednesday, the Suez committee will have completed its negotiations with Cartex Cairo. And - will have made a report.

In London, this emergency session of Parliament aroused immediate rumors - that maybe it's being called to authorize the use of force in the dispute. If the present palaver with Nasser produces no real result.

Troop landings on the island of Cyprus, today.

French soldiers and armen ashore. Twenty-seven hundred and another two thousand are expected on Cyprus in several
days.

French forces joining the British - in a military
buildup. Underscoring the declarations of London and and Paris
- that force will be used, if a satisfactory settlement
cannot be obtained in the Suez Canal crisis.

BOOBY TRAP

A new trick of the Cypriot underground - got into the news today. Could hardly help from getting into the news - because it was played on the London Bureau of the United Press.

A package arrived - addressed to the U.P. Opened - by Picture Editor Leo Stoecker. Who might have felt - mighty blue about it. The package - containing a booby-trap. Which, however, failed to work. If it had gone off, Editor Stozcker would have been - blue, indeed.

The package was triggered, so that anyone who opened it would be sprayed, With a blue dye. The pigment in the package a bright indellible color - azure, sapphire, or any other word for blue.

There was was a note saying - it was a present from the underground on Cyprus. All sounding fantastic - like

The Marine Corps tragedy at Okinawa is an example of the tracherous perils of tropical waters. A quiet ocean off
a pleasant kwak beach - no breakers or lashing waves. Nothing but hidden disaster.

Twenty-three leathernecks had been engaged in military exercises on the island. They were hot and tired - and a dip in the me ocean was in order. An officer gave them a lecture on safety precautions while in summ swimming - but there seemed mighty little reason for that. The sea was a dead calm. So, in they went, and *here's how an eyewitness tells it:-

"Before they were waist deep in water, they were in trouble," he says. "They were knocked from their feet by a vicious undercurrent, and tumbled seaward."

Below the surface of the unruffled water, a powerful undercurrent was running - and the twenty-three Marines were swept out.

Company Commander Captain Jack Westerman, immediately called on other Marines - to form a human chain and help the struggling swimmers to shore. But human chain was helpless.

The men standing in water - could not keep their feet. The undertow so powerful.

Second Lieutenant John Shanahan came running with a rubber liferaft, and pushed out. Swimmers reached the liferaft, and held on - but the raft couldn't get to shore.

Meanwhile, Battalion Commander Lieutenant Colonel Donovan, had ordered a ma nearby helicopter to the scene - with a hundred feet of rope. One end of which was dropped to the raft, and the eggbeater hauled it back to shore.

Twelve saved - but eleven Marines were missing.

People, familiar with the waysof the ocean in those parts, point out - that a typhoon has been moving along to the south of Okinawa. And a typhoon, commonly, causes freak undercurrents in tropical waters.

Publisher Robert Harrison says - yes, it was an accident. Down in the Dominician Republic today, he confirmed the story told by big game hunter Richard Weldy. Who said the shotgun fired, when he dropped it accidentally. A charge of shot - hitting Harrison in the shoulder.

The publisher of the magazine "Confidential" agrees that there was a violent argument. When his hunting party, which included a blond night club singer - encountered Weldy in a remote forest wilderness. "Confidential" had published a racy article about Weldy's former wife, now the wife of Hollywood movie actor John Wayne. Which Weldy resented bitterly - hence the argument and accidental shooting.

However, the Dominican police were still holding Weldy today. Harrison - to tell them his story of the accident.

STEVENSON-BRIEFING

Adlai Stevenson has accepted President Eisenhower's offer - of weekly secret reports on foreign policy. The Democratic nominee prescribes one qualification - that there shall be "no restrictions on free and full discussion" of international issues.

Okay with the President. - because, In Nineteen Fifty Two General Ike made the same condition. When he accepted foreign policy briefings, offered by President Truman.

Vice President Nixon addressed the American Legion convention at Los Angeles, today - representing President Eisenhower. He concentrated on world issues, and made a reply to what Adlai Stevenson told the Legion convention yesterday, when he advocated - an end of the draft - 'as early as possible consistent with national safety."

That Stevenson declaration drew a round of booing from the assembled legionaires - and Nixon, today, gave them the following:

"I would like to tell you," he said, "that we can

Asfely cut our armed forces, and get rid of the draft, cut our
defense spending - and reduce our taxes. Unfortunately,
however, the easy way out - is seldom the right way. This
is no time," he went on, "to suggest to our friends are or our
possible opponents abroad - that America is getting soft
and tired."

That statement drew prolonged applause, the Vice

President interrupted forty-four times, today, by handclapping

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and cheering.

This "end-of-the-draft"_argument is curious because the Democrats in Congress have been criticizing
the Eisenhower administration for cutting military manpower.

And here comes Adlai - wanting to stop the draft altogether.

Of course, he qualifies by saying - as early as possible,
consistent with national safety." Which could mean - anywhere
in the future.

The latest kidnap - ends in another horror. The body of six weeks old Cynthia Ruotolo found - in a lake.

The murder - deliberate. The body - enclosed in a potato sack, weighted down by a stone. The pitiful discovery made, today, by three boys out fishing.

Lake Whitney is about a mile from the store in Hamden, Connecticut - where the child was taken from her baby carriage. Apparently - by a dumpy dark skinned woman.

This, following the Weinberger case, at Westbury,
Long Island- is the second kidnap horror in recent weeks.

National Guard soldiers with fixed bayonets, forced their way that through a hostile crowd which yelled - and shoved. The state soldiers - escorting nine negro pupils into the local high school. The riot so threatening - the National Guard had four tanks rumpling along the street, on patrol.

Governor Chandler of Kentucky says - he'll keep the soldiers at Sturgis as long as necessary. To guarantee the right of the negro pupils - to attend classes.

Meanwhile, some white parents took their children out of school. Class attendance today - only fifty percent of normal.

SIGHTSEEING BOAT

Another sightseeing boat crash - in New York's Harlem River. The second -in less than a month.

Today the boat, navigating around Manhattan Island was carrying three-hundred-and-fifty-eight sight-seers. And they saw -more than they expected. ARE Across the Harlem River, there's a draw-bridge. Which was opening - to permit a tugboat to pass through. The skipper of the sightseeing boat says - he was unable to keep his own craft clear of the swinging bridge. So the ponderous bridge-section hit with a ga crash. Sheering off part of the pilot house of the sightseeing boat - and hurling a rain of debris on the passengers, who stood on the deck below. Thirty injured! five seriously.

The previous accident was at that same bridge across the Harlem River. August Eighth - when a sight-seeing boat ran into a pier of the bridge.

In the big town, it seems - sightseers may see more than that famous Manhattan skyline.

From Westport, Connecticut - an example of how not to dynamite a ditch. The blast - requiring all possible precautions. Being - only to ten feet from a local citizen's home.

The dynamite, in a ditch nine feet deep - should have been covered with chained logs. A strong protection - against the force of the blast. But instead of chained logs, the workman on the job covered the charge of dynamite - with loose boards. The result - a catastrophe.

The explosion hurled a barrage of boards, rocks and earth - which hit that nearby house. Knocking off the porch, wrecked the front door - and flinging stones into the atta attic.

No way to dynamite a ditch.

Tonight, you'll have a chance, and there won't be a better one - until kaxx the year two hundred and seventyeight thousand, two hundred and fifty-four A.D. A chance. that is - unless it's cloudy. Where I am it's raining Tonight, at one axax A.M. Eastern Daylight Time, the planet Mars will be only thirty-five-million, one-hundredand twenty thousand miles away from the earth. Which is mighty close - according to the way astronomers figure things. The red planet can be much farther away than that. Because of the elliptical orbits of Mars and this Earth, it can be as much as two-hundred-and-thirty-five million miles away. Now 200 mills miles neaver than that

All sorts of mathematical complications are involved.

But, at any rate - Mars, tonight, is at its nearest, for eons to come.

So naturally, it's a banner night for the astronomers, who have been engaged for weeks - in a worldwide effort. Seventeen observatories in ten countries - engaged

in systematic study. They don't expect anything new and startling. But they do hope they'll clear up a lot of technical details. They believe there is life on Mars - but only vegetation of a primitive sort. About which they want - more data.

You and I, menry, if the weather is clear - we won't see anything so different tonight. The Red Planet - just redder and brighter. Just over the hill - only 35 million miles away.
