One supposition is that the Nazi Command made a mistake.

We hear that the plan of the Germans had been to hold their previous

line, the Gustav line, only as a delaying action - in the face
of the overwhelming allied attack. Hold on for so long - and then
fall back to the more powerful Hitler fortifications. But the
German command held on too long. And when the time came to retire
from the Gustav line, the allied pressure was so heavy, the retreat
turned into disorder - and thus the Fifth xx Army has been able
to thrust along the coast in the face of disorganized opposition.

In any case, it would seem that, by driving to the place called Itri, the Allies are threatening to turn the Hitler Line along the Coast, outflanking it in that direction.

## BRITISH PRISONERS

The news of the Nazi killing of forty-seven escaped British prisoners has an ugly look. The Berlin account states that some were shot while resisting recapture, others while trying to get away again after being seized. That might all be according to the laws or war, but there is an angle of concealment which can only arouse suspicion.

camp at Sagan, which is in Saxony - northeast of Dresden. At that
place air officers were confined and a getaway was effected by
seventy-six -- they were mostly British, and from the British
Dominions. It is not stated whether any Americans were in the
prison break. Of the seventy-six, fifteen were retaken and returned
to the camp. Fourteen are still at large - prisoners of war who
presumably are in hiding somewhere in Germany.

The Nazis tell a story of how, when confronted with recapture, some of the ascaped air officers fought back. Also, how others, after they had been seized and were being taken back, made new attempts to escape. In that way, many says the enemy, forty-seven were killed.

The mass escape occurred on March twenty-sixth. And, according to international law, the fatalities should have been reported to the neutral Swiss government, which represents great Britain in the matter of prisoners of war. But nothing was said, no report made. Then, during the next month, on April Seventeenth, an agent for the Swiss government, on an ordinary routine visit in behalf of prisoners, went to the camp at Sagan, and there he learned of the killing of the forty-seven.

The word was conveyed to the British Government, and today was made public - by British Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden in the House of Commons. He stated that Great Britain through Switzerland, has sent to Nazi Germany a demand for an explanation of the killing of forty-seven prisoners of war.
