border from Italy at the head of a motorized column he was stopped by a vast throng of people. inally he threw up his hands and made his way aboard an Italian cruiser.

The Britisher, General Winterton never did get into the city atall. He finally sailed away with a convoy of transports. General De Renai eventually got ashore. After all as the new Military Governor he couldn't just sail away. When he did at last get to the City Hall, Be Renzi ordered the Italian flag run up. And he delivered a fifteen minute speech to the crowd packed in the square, - long after the time for that ceremony. As for our General Dabney, well he may still be'lost' in the howling throng.
