Good Evening Everybody:

On the banks of the sacred river Jumna, near

New Delhi - the age-old funeral rites of Hindustan.

The rites of remation that go back - thousands of years.

Back to the time when most of humanity vas choosing between fire and earth, cremation - and burial. The Hindus of the great Subcontinent - chose cremation.

Much history was summarized - by the
obsequies for Jawaharlal Nehru. Hinds priests, chanting the litany for the dead - as the body of the late Prime Minister was carried to its funeral pyre.

The mortal remains of Nehru, clad in the long white coat - the sherwani - of Hindustan. Pinned to it - a single red rose. Around hisneck - a garland of jasmine. The fire was ignited by one of Nehru's
grandsons. And a crowd of one-hundred-thousand pressed

close to the pyre - as the flames roared through the banks of Sandalwood, creating a heat so intense - with the temperature at one-hundred degrees to begin withthat many mourners were overcome. And there we se some - fatalities.

> The end of the funeral ceremony - the
scattering of the ashes on the Jumna River. The waters of the Jumna - the final resting place of Jawaharlal Nehru.

The American representative at the funeral
will go from New Delhi to Bangkok. And then - on to Honolulu. Secretary of State Rusk, to preside over a meeting - of the top Americans in Southeast Asia. Plus Cabot Lodge, Secretary McNamara, General Maxwell Taylor - and Presidential Envoy William Bund. You can judge the importance from Bund's case. He was supposed to stay in London - for talks with British officials. Then came the order from President Johnson, and Bundy was off for Hawaii - from the opposite side of the world.

The announcement that American economic aid to Formosa will be discontinued after the next fiscal year -is no slap at the Nationalist Chinese. It's a recognition that Chang Kail She is running a solvent regime. Formosa's economic growth -so spectacular - that the Island can support itself. Private enterprise bringing prosperity to the far Pacific.
American military aid to Formosa - will
continue, perhaps in a more spectacular way - judging
from Ching Kat She's tour of the Offshore Islands.

The gossip around Tai meh has it - that this will be the year of big commando raids on the mainland.

Now a follow-up to last night's story of the Marxist witch-doctors of the Congo. We heard how the medicine men were stirring up the tribesmen on the shores of Lake Tanganyika. Shouting Communist slogans - to the beating of the tom-toms, and instigating the warriors to attack villages in the bushwith bows and arrows.

The rampaging Congolese have captures the
city - of Albertville. And tonight are driving - on Baudouinville. Jungle metropolis - of northern Katanga Province. The witch doctors, acting as well - could we call them "chaplains?" The "clergy" of a weird "religion" - that combines the age-old superstitions of Africa with the propaganda of modern Communism.

In the 19th century, there was a familiar
figure in Africa - the white man with a rifle in one hand and a Bible in the other. Now, in a few areas
it's the witch doctor - with a spear in one hand, and the "Communist Manifesto" in the other.

An America - without poverty or prejudice - the Utopia all men strive for.

The Johnsomrip to New York - staidly

Senator Goldwater was talking today about
fair play. The A izonan with the G.O.P. primary only five days away, lambasting what he terms - a Rockefeller-Lodge coalition. Charging that the coalition is violating - "the spirit of fair play." The Saturn-One, roaring up from Cape Kennedy - with a rocket thrust of one and one-half million pounds. The flight took - ten minutes. Each stage-
functioning perfectly, until the moonship broke away and entered its orbit one-hundred miles above the surface of the earth. The sixth straight success -
for Saturn-One, the rocket due to become - the workhorse of our Apollo program, the one to send a capsule with two astronauts - to the Moon.

With the Memorial Day weekend coming along, and eighty-million cars on our highways, what will be the tragic toll? The National Safety Council predicts that four-hundred and ninety may die in traffic accidents by Monday.

As for Memorial Day itself - we have two more great Americans to remember this year.

President John $F$. Kennedy and General Douglas

MacArthur. And the "Thresher Bells" will be rung for the first time. The bells in the chapel at the chipyard - in Portsmouth, New Hampshire, commemorat ing the one-hundred and twenty-nine men lost - when the nuclear sub "Thresher" sank in the Atlantic last year.

If you want to do a back flip -you'd better
not do it on the deck of an aircraft carrier in a stormy
sea. Unless you want to be court martialed-and spend some time in the brig.

Evidence - Dave Sadinsky of Duquesne,

Pennsylvania. Dave was a sailor - aboard the carrier
Intrepid. During a run through a rough sea -he bet
his buddies that he would do a back flip over the side.

And - he won his bet.

A destroyer fished him - out of the water.

And he was returned to the carrier - that is, to the
brig. A court martial sentenced him - to five months.
A review board revised the conviction, saying
there's nothing in Naval regulations - forbidding
back flips from a carrier,.
But an appeals board says Dave Sadinsky's
gymnastics feat comes under the heading of - "disorders prejudicial to discipline."
