> President Nixon versus the U.S. Senate - again.

The President today expressing strong objections - to a

Senate plan for cutting back U.S. troop strength in Europe

- reducing it by sixty thousand men. The President says
such a move could severely damage the American position -
in "vitally important new initiatives for peace" right around
the globe. This - he stated - in a letter to Chairman

Stennis of the Senate Armed Services Committee. Then later
today the Senate upheld the President by a vote of fifty-four
to thirty-nine.

On another front Mr. Nixon met with Republican

Congressional leaders; who later said he was giving "very
serious consideration" to the possibility that he might have to veto his long-sought tax-cut bill. All because of that
amendment intended to permit Federal financing of next year's

President campaign. Senate Minotiry Leader Hugh Scott -
adding, on his own: "If we have to write a new bill - we may be here a long time.

After two weeks of foot-dragging - a showdown vote today in the Senate Judiciary Committee; with the President's two new choices for the Supreme court - easily winning endorsement.

In the case of Lewis Powell - a unanimous vote; This clearing the way - for speedy confirmation. In the case of William Rehnquist -a twelve-to-four vote; with opponents later pledging a floor fight. However

Administration leaders express confidence, that both will make it maybe next week.

KARACHI-NEW DELHI

The government of Pakistan today proclaimed a state
of national emergency because of, quote - "the danger
of foreign attacks." Karachi saying fighting is already in progress in four areas of East Pakistan bordering India.

New Delhi still insists only Pakistani rebels are involved.

Washington is urging utmost restraint - on both sides.
At Vienna - another two-hour session of SALT
talks today; again said to have been - "unusually intensive;"
with the whole time devoted to formal discussion - and no tine for chit-chat.

Indeed, the SALT delegates setting their next parley for Thursday - even though

In the Middle East -at Cairo - Egypt's President

Anwar Sadat met for two hours today with a Black African peace mission; but he insisted throughout that there can be no peace - without an Israeli commitment to withdraw from all occupied Egyptian territory.

Meanwhile, at Jerusalem - the Parliament was as Dorachi
