UNITED NATIONS

The recent applications of the two Germanys for UN membership were both approved unanimously today by the UN Security Council. There was speedy action to clear the way for quick presentation of their applications to the General Assebmly which is expected to make final approval one of its first moves when it re-convenes for its next session, September Eighteenth.

THE HAGUE

In a verdict rendered at the international court of justice in the Hague - France was found guilty as charged today; guilty of polluting the earth's environment - with radio active fall-out. This by means of its continuing nuclear testing in the South Pacific. The court further urging France to cease and desist. All of which is well and good perhaps, but Paris quickly issued a statement of its own telling the court of justice it has no jurisdiction over this.

BONN

Meanwhile at Bonn - France's President Pompidou was meeting today with West Germany's Chancellor Willy Brandt. This in a way a response to the Nixon-Brezhnev summit; with Pompidou said to be seeking greater European unity - when dealing with the two super powers. All this will have much to do with forthecoming trade talks between the U.S. and the Common Market nations.

MARTHA

Outspoken Martha Mitchell - again put in a telephone call to her U P I reporter friend saying her husband, John Mitchell, is "a hurt person" - because of his implication in the Watergate scandal.

Martha Mitchell however saying the former Attorney General would still "go to jail for Richard Nixon." "I don't know why," she continued - "but maybe because he had so much faith in Nixon - even after this."

INDIANA POLIS

Senator Barry Goldwater of Arizona - has also been known to speak his mind on occasion. The latest example - a Republican Fund Raising Dinner at Indianapolis; the subject - again Watergate.

Barry Goldwater saying: "The press never goes after these things when it concerns a Democrat - just a Republican. Adding: "If a Democrat does it - that's cute." Barry Goldwater also saying: "As cover-ups go" Senator Kennedy's Chappaquiddick incident was far worse. If <u>I</u> had run that girl off the bridge - said he - "you wouldn't have heard the end of it."

VATICAN

In ceremonies marking the tenth anniversary of his election - Pope Paul today addressed visiting Cardinals and Vatican prelates; saying the Roman Catholic church must overcome "division, misunderstanding and mutual suspicions" between its liberal and conservative wings; must do so - said he - if it is ever to live up to the challenge - of a trouble time.
