WHITE HOUSE

Austria's Chancellor Bruno Kreisky - a guest today at the White House - where he was warmly greeted by President Ford. ^{The} Chancellor responding by saying he comes from a country - "which greatly appreciates the great contributions of the United States."

Another White House caller - House Speaker Carl Albert; who later said he expects Congress ^{ional} ~~to complete~~ _^ ~~its~~ ^{Vice Presidential} _^ action on the nomination of Nelson Rockefeller ~~as~~ ~~Vice President~~ - by the end of the year. Says Rockefeller "I'm hopeful, but not confident."

GIBSON

As expected, the nomination of Edward Gibson as head of the Federal Energy Administration was withdrawn today at his own request. White House spokesman Ron Nessen ~~who announced Gibson's withdrawal~~ ~~going on to say~~ - "We are now looking for a new administrator. - ~~but cautiously.~~"

~~Nessen also said that up-coming economic figures - will show the nation is moving into a recession - but he added - the President ^{is} still pressing for passage - of his previously announced anti-inflation program. This on the grounds that it was inflation that caused the recession - and, "inflation is still a serious problem."~~

NEW YORK FOLLOW GRO CER

On the brighter side - an address today by Treasury Secretary William Simon - at a New York meeting of the American Petroleum Institute. Simon saying there may be further short term increases - in world oil prices; but "over the long run" - said he - "the ~~gan~~ question is no longer whether oil prices will come down - but when they will come down."

QUITO

At Quito, Ecuador - the Organization of American States finally voted today on a move to end ten years of economic sanctions against Cuba. ~~A two thirds majority or fourteen votes - needed to pass. But~~ ~~the final tally coming out - only~~ twelve for, three against, ~~and~~ six abstaining ~~and~~ including the U.S.
