Ray C. Bliss today held his first solo news conference as Republican National Chairman - designate. In it, he said first that the Republican Party is not dead, and second that it will not be a minority party for long.

His job, said Bliss, will be to find qualified Republican candidates and to help them get elected. But he said he will not make many public speeches because - "I have always felt that it is my duty to build up others - not Ray Bliss".

One thing more - Bliss expects to have a "relatively free hand" in running the GOP party organization. He said that Republican running mates Barry Goldwater and William Miller - as well as retiring Chairman Dean Burch-have already given him their promise. They will not make any statements beyond those they made yesterday in Phoenix - at least for the time being.

### PLANES

Two supersonic American fighter planes were shot down over Laos today. One pilot has been rescued. A search is underway tonight for the other. The Defense Department in Washington refused to comment on their mission. But there are reports that the two planes were flying combat missions against the Communist line-of-supply - from North Viet Nam through Laos to South Viet Nam. Since last June six U.S. reconnaissance or fighter jets have been shot down by ground fire in Laos.

But U.S. and U.N. officials both emphasized that the amount is far short of the total Russia must pay if it is to escape loss of its vote in the General Assembly. Even with today's payment, they noted, the Russian obligation still stands at about sixty-one million.

Moreover, most of that is Russia's bill for peace - keeping missions to the Congo and the Middle East, which the Soviets say they will never pay.
