Today's decision by the Supreme Court is called the most important action of its kind since the emancipation
proclamation. The high tribunal outlawing - racial
segregation in schools.

The decision, written by Chief Justice Earl Warren was unanimous. A number of complaints against racial segregation in schools - upheld in one sweeping decision.

The court ruled against the southern theory of "separate but equal facilities." The decision stating: "separate educational facilities are inherently unequal."

The verdict is complete and sweeping, but it does not mean - total change at once. The court notes - "the far reaching character" of its action. Also - the "great variety" of local conditions to be considered. So, there will be further hearings on the way the decision is to be put into effect. The details are delaying until autumn - and, actually, it may be a year before the court rules on the

methods to end segregation in schools.

With new proposals - to transform the public schools into a private school system. At a technical change, mostly, but one which might evade constitutional questions of segregation.

Already, three states, Georgia, South Carolina and Mississippi, have taken preliminary steps - to turn their public school systems over to private operation.

Meanwhile, negro and sympathetic white groups in the south are jubilant. One organization calling a meeting of its leaders in Birmingham, to decide on plans in line with today's decision.

The McCarthy hearings have been moving toward a clash between the Sub-Committee and the White House - and make matters came to a head today. With President Eisenhower in a signed letter, forbidding further testimony - about that much debated meeting, in which White House aides participated.

The Army Counsel was questioned further on this, and replied - had official instructions - top level, to say no more about what went on at that meeting. Today, that something in writing was produced - and how! A letter from the President, stating - it is not permissible to reveal discussions in the Executive branch

Sub-committee members promptly protested especially the Democrats. So did Senator McCarthy - who called the presidential prohibition an "iron curtain."

The argument argument was based on this interesting situation: Army Counsel Adams last week testified of his own volition - indetating possibly, that the responsibility for making the Army charges had been, actually, over on the side of the White House. But then, having said that much, Adams was forbidden to say any more. The sub-committee had supposed - that Army Secretary Stevens had made the decision. So now they felt - they were being deprived of a vital piece of information.

Reds - give ugly accounts, now so familiar. After the fall of Dien Bien Phu, they underwent ordeals of neglect, ill treatment, and a brain washing of Red propaganda.

One of them, Corporal Marcel Champery, tells of the end at Dien Bien Phu - the last he saw of General de Castries, Commander of the heat heroic garrison, and of the nurse, Genevive.

He says he lay in a trench - wounded in the leg,
When he saw the Reds - leading General DeCastries away, a
prisoner; "We was detached and impassive," says the Corporal.

The wounded were left lying where they were, for three days. Then, at length, Indo Chinese doctors appeared.

But they had no medicines, and performed operations without anesthetics. Which so was followed by the most astonishing thing of all.

"To our surprise," the Corporal relates, "French doctors and orderlies were brought back. But they were given household jobs, like cooking and sweeping. They tore that allowed to come blose to the wounded."

Among them - the nurse Genevive. "I watched her," says the Corporal, "doing little chores, where she could make herself useful. The "Angel of Dien Bien Phu" put to work - sweeping floors, washing dishes, cleaning house.
