CHURCHILL: The common people came today to pay their last respects to Sir Winston Churchill. They turned out in the tens of thousands, forming a line that stretched at times a full mile from Westminster Hall.

There were young and old, feeble and sturdy, rich and poor -- and even a member of the royal family. Prince William of Gloucester, a cousin to Queen Elizabeth and eighth in succession to the throne, waited in line, in shivering cold, like all the rest.

Inside Westminster Hall, the coffin of the honored statesman rested on a black velvet catafalque -- in the same spot where four British kings and queens have lain in state before him.

And the saddened faces of his mourners mirrored the nation's loss.

The gnu, as you know, is an animal that looks, oh, just a little bit like the American buffalo, not much, just a little. At any rate, it's the hardiest and one of the commonest of the great animals of Africa. It's estimated there are some ten thousand gnu living right here on the floor of this Ngorongoro Crater.

The Tanganyika government gave Dick Estes a permit to bring a one-room pre-fab cabin, and set it up right in the middle of the Ngorongoro Crater, hidden under a huge red fig tree. It's so camouflaged that you would never see it, unless someone took you to the spot.

This is the calving season for the gnu, and today we saw hundreds of little gnu, only a few hours old. And only a few yards away, their sinister mouths drooling, jackals and hyena, waiting to hill them, which they so often do.

Dick Estes has a specially built car in which he can roam the floor of this great crater, studying the animals. But the engine in it needs overhauling, and only yesterday it stalled when he was within a few yards of a lion. I forgot to mention that Dick has an attractive wife, the daughter of an Austrian Tanganyika planter. The family comes from Innsbruck, Austria where the Winter Olympics were held a year ago. Her name Runhild. Her father a former Austrian Baron, in the days of the Emperor Franz Joseph.

After Dick Estes had been out here in the Ngorongoro Crater for over a year, Dick got Lonely and fell in love with the beautiful Runhild. I'm told she gave him a rather wild run-around, she kept him guessing for months and months. My Kenya companion, Chris Roberts, says she nearly drove the young Cornell grad student out of his mind. Ah, but, she finally gave in. And now she lives with him on the floor of the Ngorongoro Crater in that one-room pre-fab bungalow, underneath that red fig tree - like Adam and Eve - surrounded by tens

of thousands of wild animals. Including zebra, rhino, herds of elephants, thousands of gnu that husband Dich is studying, and lion.

A moment ago I mentioned that his car had been having engine trouble and stalled, right in front of a huge male lion. The lion didn't move. So there was only one thing that Dick Estes could do. His wife was with him. He left her at the wheel, and he got out and cranked the engine, with that male lion looking on. And you're not supposed to get out of your car down on the floor of the Ngorongoro Crater. If you do you may be charged by a rhino, or an elephant, or a lion. At any rate, Dick Estes was lucky that day and he's still going right on with his work for that Cornell Ph. D. degree.

In South Viet Nam tonight, thousands of jubilant Buddhists poured into the streets in public celebration of the latest government upheaval..

Meanwhile, repercussions from the bloodless coup - the eighth in that country in little more than a year - reverberated throughout the Far East and straight to Washington.

Red China called the government shakeup a tremendous victory "for the people of Viet Nam". Radio Peking crowed that "the figurehead regime" of Premier Tran Van Huong had fallen under the combined weight of military defeat and "extreme" political "confusion".

In this country, the coup was seen by some as the forerunner of renewed Buddhist pressure for a negotiated peace with Communist Viet Cong. However, Washington authorities refused immediate comment on the new military regime. White House Press Secretary

George Reedy perhaps best summed up official Washington reaction when he said: "I think we just have to wait for some further information".

A fifty-year-old postal worker turned himself into a human torch today in Madras City, India. It was the second such suicide in the last two days, both in protest against the adoption of Hindi as the official language of India.

In the nearby city of Chidambaram, one student was hilled and another injured when police opened fire on a mob also protesting the language change. Both cities are in the state of Madres, where the common tongue is that of Tamil, the oldest, richest and most highly-organized of the ancient Dravidian languages of South India.

Another thirty cadets have resigned from the U.S. Air Force Academy in the service school's widening cheating scandal. The new resignations raise to sixty-five the total number of cadets who have quit school since the cheating investigation began nine days ago.

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REMITORE OF SHIP

Seventeen of the eighteen white men charged with conspiring to hill three civil rights workers were arraigned today in Meridian, Mississippi. All pleaded innocent, and all were released on bond previously set at fifty-seven hundred dollars apiece. Trial is to be set at a later date.

The eighteenth defendant in the case will go before a Federal judge in Atlanta, where he is expected to plead either guilty or no contest.

Richard F. Stolz, who was ordered expelled from the Soviet Union as an American spy, today denied any part in the Russians' alleged spy plot. In a brief Moscow news conference, the American diplomat concurred with U.S. officials in Washington. They view his ouster as a retaliation for the recent American expulsion of an alleged Soviet spy.

At the same time, Stolz suggested stoically that the threat of spy charges is something of an occupational hazard to diplomatic service in Russia.
