GOOD EVENING EVERYBODY:

The American Attorney General has told the President of Indonesia -- that our policy is to head off a major war in the Far Pacific. Robert Kennedy, warning Sukarno -- not to begin such a conflict by attacking the new Federation of Malaysia.

RETAKE

The word "escalation" is prominent -- in these Kennedy-Sukarno talks in Tokyo. The Attorney General, pointing out that should the Malaysians be attacked -- the British would have to support them and that would involve -- Australia and New Zealand.

To fight the Commonwealth -- Sukarno would probably have 'to ally himself with Red China. And the final step might force **that** the Soviet Union and the United States -- to enter on opposite sides.

Escalation, from a border conflict on Borneo -- to a clash of the big powers. Robert Kennedy appealing to Sukarno's common sense -- not to let that happen.

Panamanian extremists are still demanding

- that the Canal treaties **no** be re-negotiated. Our

government still proposing - that the treaties be

discussed. If the linguistic difficulty can be resolved

- that will be the first step toward a political solution.

Meanwhile our Embassy in Panama City has **ben** been

diplomatic evacuated -- the/personnel moved to the Canal Zone for

safeetyx. at the demand of the Panamanian government.

#### DEGAULLE

The rumor that France will recognize Red China - does not come as any surprise. It's been circulating around Paris - for many weeks.

. De Raulle's motives - are well known. He

thinks that direct negotiations with Mao Tse Tung - might lead to peace in Southeast A<sub>s</sub>ià. Especially - in Viet Nam. And secondly, DeGaulle is convinced - that the dispute between Russia and Red China is going to get much worse. A development that he hopes to exploit in the interests of the West - by having his own man in Peking.

### ZANZIBAR

If you want to use understatement about Zanzibar -just call the situation "confused". Chiefly responsible -- the so-called strong man of the island. Jon Okello -- who has granted himself the title of Field Marshal. -- Okello went on the air this morning to proclaim himself President of Zanzibar. This afternoor he went on the air and called that statement -- a vicious rumor, put out by enemies of the revolutionary regime.

Since we don't know the status of the Field Marshall the status of his top lieutenant is in doubt. Sheik Abid Karume arrested a group of Americans -- at the point of a gun, and ordered them -- to leave the island. He called himself --President of Zanzibar. Today's events indicate that there may be a struggle for power -- between Sheik Abid Karume and Field Marshall John Okello. A struggle for control -- of the spice island of Zanzibar.

### VIET NAM

The four American soldiers killed in South Viet Nam - were taking part in the largest helicopter assault ever mounted. Fifty of the whirly-birds, flying almost two thousand men - to seven **babbabe** battle zones. At least ten - hit by enemy fire. One, exploding in the air - and falling into the jungle. Causing - the American casualties.

The battle is raging - tonight. Vietnamese troops, storming intramating island oux in the Mekong River. A key Red fortress - in South Viet Nam.

## GLENN

Will John Glenn have more trouble in politics-than he had in orbit?

At any rate, our first astronaut to fly through outer space--is not receiving universal applause from his party. Certainly not from Senator Stephen Young of Ohio-who holds the seat that John Glenn wants. Young says he intends to stay in the race--for the Democratic nomination, and predicts that in the primary he'll win out over the astronaut turned-politician.

Some Buckeye veterans on Capitol Hill are supporting Senator Young. For example, Congressman Charles Vanik-who puts it this way:--"In government, we cannot risk weightlessness--or untested free flight."

But Congressman Mike Feighan of Ohio--takes the opposite view. He thinks the Glenn candidacy will produce--"one of the most interesting" of all primary contests this year

One thing is clear--John Glenn took a long time-making up his mind. He could have stayed in the Marines--

and been a top strategist of our space program. He could have gone into business--where several lucrative offers were his for the taking.

Instead--he chose politics. He believes he can do more for his country. Hence he's announcing his candidacyfor the Democratic Primary of May Fifth. If he wins that preliminary he'll run against the Republican nominee, possibly --Bob Taft, Jr.
