## EISENHOWER BUDGET 4 i.-Ddeot thurs. Ape, 18- $>7$.

President Eisenhower told Congress, today - to slash one billion, three hundred million dollars from appropriations thelwhite House has requested. About half of that would come out of that record breaking budget of seventy-one billion, eight hundred million. In addition, the President told Congress that an Army item, for five hundred and sixteen million - could be postponed for a year. Which would bring the total savings up to one billion, eight hundred and fif'ty-eight million. All of which would lay the foundation for a tax cut. Especially considering - that the U.S. Treasury expects a surplus of one billion, eight hundred million for next year. The President stated all this in reply to a Congressional resolution passed in March, requesting Mr. Eisenhower - to suggest reductions in the budget. Today's reaction in Congress - immediate. Speaker Sam Rayburn of Texaspredicting a tax cut, effective January First of next year.

## CANADA

The Canadian government makes an official statement
in the case of E. Herbert Norman, the Canadian Ambassador to

Cairo, who committed suicide earlier this month. The statement shows that, in Canada, Norman was listed for ten years - as a Communist. But was cleared of the charge - in Nineteen Fifty. This comes from Canadian Minister of External

Affairs, Lester Pearson, replying - to criticism in the in that Montreal paper Montreal Gazette. Articles/-accusing the Canadian government of blundering in the Norman affair.

Lester Pearson states that, while a student, Norman had associated with Communists. His ideological beliefs, in

Pearson's words - "close to some brand of Communism." But/he abandoned - his Leftist views.

In N neteen Forty, the Secret Service of the

Canadian Mounted Police reported Norman - to be a Communist. With no change of that - until Nineteen Fifty. When a report by the Royal Canadian Police cleared the diplomat. Saying that the derogatory information was "either a case of

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mistaken identity. Or - unfounded rumor."

We now learn that the Senate Internal Security

Committee in Washington got its information from the Nineteen

Forty Canadian Security report - listing Norman as a Communist.

On which was based - the charge of Communism against the

Canadian Ambassador to Cairo. The suicide following - Canada protesteridy to the United States.

From today's declaration at Ottawa, we get the
impression - that the Committee in Washington had the Canadian

Security report of Nineteen Forty, listing Norman as a

Communist. But not the Nineteen Fifty report - clearing him.

Failing to do so earlier, because he was - too confused.
for the Arab Legion. Which crack unit - is about the only effective military force the little kingdom has. Major General Ali Hayyari - taking the place of Major General Ali Numwar. The latter $\pi^{\text {a fugitive in Syria. All of which is accompanied }}$ by word - of an attempt, last weekend, to overthrow King Hussein. A Leftist plan - to take over the control of Jordan. The Chief-of-Staff of the Arab Legion - involved in this. Getting away - when the scheme failed. So now the Arab Legion has a new commander - loyal to the King.

The U.N. Truce Organization is calling - for a cease-fire on the border of Israel and Syria. Where there was a gun-fight between Israeli and Syrian troops, today. The two parties exchanging shots - without casualties, apparently. Each side - blaming the other.

Earlier, there was a similar scrap on the border of

Israel and Jordan.

RUSSIAN - ATOMIC

Soviet Russia - staging another atomic explosion, on Tuesday. The U.S. Atomic Energy Commission calls it - "one of the largest" in the current series. The fifth - since April Third.

Yesterday, Japan reported - radioactive rain. Which came, apparently, from the scene of Red atomic tests, somewhere in Central Asia.

Today, we hear of a Japanese proposal - made to a U.N. Sub-Committee in London. Calling - for a registration of all plans for atomic testing. Projected explosions - put on record, trxyedsenvecx five months in advance. What difference it would make - to know in advance?

The French transportation walkout - climaxed in a blaze of violence, today. A thousand Communist-led subway strikers - battling the police. The trouble included - a sit-down strike, on the sidewalk. Which continued - with a wild fracas . The rioters - hurling a barrage of paving stones. The police - using clubs, tear gas, and streams of water from fire hoses.

The end of the strike - set for midnight. Concludinga two-day demonstration 〈emphasizing

On the island of Sicily, a series of explosions all
day long. The news dispatch saying - it's like blasts of artillery fire. Thundering out - one per minute. In other words, Mt. Etna - on the rampage again.

That far famed volcano - bursting, today, in a new eruption. Belching - fire, smoke, ashes and molten lava. Balls of incandescent rock - hurled six to seven hundred feet in the air. Fiery rivers of lava - moving down the mountainside, Villagers at the foot of Etna, preparing to leave their homes, if the lava keeps coming.

Mt. Etna, a terror since the days of classical
antiquity, is reputed to have taken a million lives - indamp five hundred recorded eruptions. In Sixteen Sixty-Nine alove one hundred thousand people were killed. Half the city of Catania destroyed.

In recent years, a system of warning and evacuation has eliminated most of the danger to the people. But an eruption of Etna, like the one today, can create enormous

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damage.
villages and orange and lemon groves.

A Brooklyn judge, today, gave a verdict - in the case of George Metesky, the "Mad Bomber." Declaring him - insane. And ordering him - to the Matteawan State Hospital.

Brooklyn Judge Leibowitz based his ruling on a report
from psychiatrists. Saying the "Mad Bomber" was demented, and was dying from tuberculosis.

But Metesky faced a charge in Manhattan, as well as
in Brooklyn - after having planted fifty hamax bombs all over the metropolis. Manhattan Judge Mullen - ruling that he was mentally capable of standing trial. The Manhattan Judge basing his verdict on the same medical report as the Brooklyn Judge but coming to a contrary conclusion.

So now, after the Brooklyn verdict of insane - it
remains to be seen whether or not the "Mad Bomber" will be put on trial in Manhattan.

At Suffield, Connecticut, "Machine-gun Kos" fired his last two shots, today. One - killing an FBI agent. The other - killing himself. Ending - one of the biggest manhunts in the history of New England.
