Today brought the most deadly, violent battle, thus far, in the trouble along the Suez Canal. It began as a result of an order from London -- an order confirmed by British Prime Minister Churchill. This was -- disarm the Egyptian police at Ismailia.)

No resistance was anticipated, when British troops, backed by powerful centurion tanks, went on the mission. But, when the police were told to surrender their weapons, they refused. The British troops had been ordered - not to fire, unless fired upon. So they waited, and parleyed.

Then, several shots were fired from the police barracks. A centurion tank replied with a blank shell - merely a shot of warning. But that was the signal for all-out battle. Immediately, the Egyptian police opened with everything they had - a furious blast of gunfire, the British reply was in the same kind -- with everything they had.

Artillery shells ripped three buildings

held by the police, and the centurion tanks lunged forward. At the barracks, the monster tanks rammed the walls of mascnry, and crashed through, while twenty-five pound shells at close range completed the destruction.

The Egyptian police, a thousand of them, fought like fanatics, and sixty were killed in the battle, which lasted for five hours - the British losing four. A small party in the Governor's mansion yielded only when the whole place was shot into wreckage. (Troops with bayonets fought their way from room to room.)

Tonight, all British warships at the Malta Naval atation, except smaller craft were ordered to steam to the Suez Canal, as today's battle brings a new crisis.

The latest - a dispatch stating that

Egypt will break off diplomatic relations with Great

Britain this weekend, unless there are what Cairo

calls "Major Political Developments." It is hard to

imagine what these might be, unless Cairo thinks

London might make a lot of consessions.

Tonight's decision came from a meeting of the Egyptian Cabinet, which was called immediately after news of the battle of Isamalia.

At the U N meeting in Paris, Soviet Russia scored a victory today. The political committee passed a resolution introduced by the Moscow delegation, and opposed by the United States and other western powers.

the United Nations, fourteen of them, five Red satellites, Albania, Bulgaria, Hungary, Romania; and, outer Mongolia. Two members of the Atlantic Treaty organization - Italy and Portugal. Seven called neutrals not in the Atlantic Treaty - Ireland, Finland, Austria, Jordan, Nepal, Ceylon and Libya.

Our delegation opposes the admission of the Red satellites, on grounds that include the violation of peace treaties made with them. The Soviets called for a "package deal" and were able to score a success. They rallied what is called an "Arab-Asian bloc" -- lesser countries, inclined sometimes to oppose American leadership. So it was today, when the Red resolution was carried - twenty-one to twelve, with

twenty-five nations abstaining.

But the Communist victory in the committee is believed to be merely technical -- the resolution likely to be defeated when it comes before the General Assembly. Tonight U S delegate Ernest Gross declared that many of the countries that voted for the measure did not know what they were doing.

## KOREA TRUCE

Today, in the Panmunjom truce tents, American General Turner outlined a plan whereby they would go ahead with other problems, on which general agreement has already been reached and work out the details. Such problems as armistice inspection and troop rotation.

KOREA WAR

a M I G, then another, then another - seven in all.

PHILIPPINES -

The President of the Philippines calls for immediate alliance among the nations of the Pacific - thereby coming out in support of the proposal urged by Governor Dewey yesterday. Dewey, titular head of the Republican party, advocated a full scale defense pact, guaranteeing the nations bordering the Pacific against Red aggression. Today, at Manila, President Quirino described he was all for the Dewey suggestion.

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Canada will be without a Governor General for a month. So announced at Ottawa today, following the appointment of Vincent Massey. The retiring Governor General, Viscount Alexander, will step out on Monday - but Massey will not assume office until February Twenty Eighth. In the interim, the functions of the office will be performed by Canadian Chief Justice Thibaudeau.

Vincent Massey will be the first Canadian born Governor-General that Canada has ever had, the first Commoner, too -- the post having been held hitherto by titled noblemen from Britain. He's a brother of Raymond Massey, the actor who rose to fame in the United States years ago, enacting Abraham Lincoln in a highly successful play.
