

This evening I have to report 1 sedition, mutiny, revolt, and civil war over in Germany--but it's somewhat of the comic opera variety.

Handsome Adolph Hitler is Germany's 5 star fire eater. He's the leader of 6 Germany's fire eating Fascist party. 7 Handsome Adolph is known far and wide 8 as a trouble maker, but now somebody 9 is making trouble for him. And the 10 complaint is that Handsome Adolph can't 11 eat fire hot and fast enough. 12

There's a revolt in the Fascist 13 ranks. The New York Evening Post informs 14 us that one section of the Fascist 15 organization has turned against Handsome 16 Adolph and that a bitter fight is on. 17

The real origin of the trouble 18 came when Hitler formed a special 19 organization of Storm Troops within his 20 Fascist party. These Storm Troops were 21 to be the actual fighters who were to 22 overthrow the German republic. Hitler 23 promised them action and plenty of fire 24 eating. He announced that the trouble 25

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would begin immediately. But as time 1 went on nothing happened. Handsome 2 Adolph's fire eating consisted mostly 3 of talking. And discontent began to spread among those Storm Troops who were 5 eager to devour fire in large quantities, 6 real fire and not mereter talk. 7

Hitler has been trying to suppress 8 the revolt against his authority. One 9 leader of the revolt was Captain Stenser, 10 the commander of the Storm Troops. He 11 tried to throw Stenser out of his job. 12 But Stenser broke into open revolt. 13 And today he has seized Hitler's chief 14 headquarters and defies Hitler to put 15 him out. 16

Meanwhile the German government is 17 enjoying a good laugh. A few months ago 18 the German leaders were trembling at 19 Hitler's threats. Every time he ate a 20 mouthful of fire they shook in their 21 boots. But now it looks as if Handsome 22 Adolph would have to eat, not fire, but 23 humble pie. In other words, he'll have 24 to eat crow and ask the police to help 25

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.1 him get his headquarters back and throw 2 out the rebellious fire eater. 3 And that, with all the fire eating, is what I'd call a pretty "hot" story! 4 5 In fact, it's my news item of the day. 6 It was picked for me by David 7 Lawrence, editor of the United States Digest offices today. 8 9 * David Lawrence is a well-known 10 political correspondents and one of our 11 the foremost experts on affairs of

statecraft. He points out that the fire eating story is not merely funny but also important.

Handsome Adolf Hitler been made his big splurge because of conditions of depression and unrest in Germany. Those same conditions are of vital interest to us because prosperity is a world wide affair, and is based on international trade, and anything which indicates a waning of unrest and a greater stability for government in a country like Germany promises a great benefit for the rest of the world, ours included.
