"Nations that compromise with terrorism today" - said he - "could be destroyed by terrorism tomorrow."

Pearl S. Buck - the daughter of Presbyterian
missionaries; born in West Virginia - but raised in China;
after her college days here in the States she - returned to
China where she in turn married a missionary. She also
taught in Chinese Universities - storing up a treasure trove
of Chinese lore and history. She had learned to speak
Chinese before she spoken English. Once she told me she
often spoke. Chinese in her dreams - as she slept.

"Her first book was "East Wind, West Wind;" followed by "The Good Earth" - which won her a Pulitzer Prize and eventually a Nobel Prize; for "rich and epic portrayals of Chinese life - and for masterpieces of biography."

Pearl Buck wrote more than thirty books, as well as numerous stories and articles. Her hobby was her philanthropic work - giving away the millions she earned

for the benefit of Amer-Asian children. Along the way, adopting and raising nine youngsters - in addition to her own two.

Her good works will continue through the Pearl Buck

Foundation - which she founded a decade ago.
