"Whip inflation now" - "Win" for short. - the battle cry sounded today by President Ford - as no doubt you've heard by now. This in a special address - to a formal joint session of congress. The President's long awaited anti-inflation program - based on some thirty specific proposals. These including a drastic cut in federal spending - along with a five percent tax surcharge the middle and upper income brackets a new energy conservation program - and a return to all out food production; also, an increase in unemployment benefits - a new tax break for the poor a stand-by community improvement course, something like the WPA - plus a big boost in federally guaranteed mortgage funds. The President, calling inflation - "our present public enemy number one." "Unless it is whipped" said he - ! it will destroy our country, our homes, our liberty, our property, and

finally our national pride." It will do this -said he

-- just "as surely as any well-armed war-time enemy."

and swely the most forceful and dynamic speech we have heard so far from the President

Earlier in the day - a special appeal to the House alone. President Ford urging the House "to reconsider U.S. its hasty act" -- in voting a ban on military aid to Turkey; and then to work with the Senate to pass a new foreign aid bill - "that will best serve the interests of peace." If not - said the President he will have no choice but to exercise his veto.

The President also as met today - with policies.

Polish Communist leader Edward Gierek. The President noting that Poland, as a source of coal - "has a role to play in seeking a resolution to the world energy problem." In response, Gierek saying his US visit - is "yet another reaffirmation of international detente."

The White House again - an announcement - the President will hold another news conference at two thirty tomorrow afternoon. This one - in the White House Rose Garden, when weather permitting. A new setting and a new format. The President permit follow-up questions from each reporter he recognizes if his first answer fails to suffice.
