DRUGS

New York State's new drug law - called the Nation's toughest - goes into effect tomorrow with mandatory life sentences for some offenders - and rewards as incentives for informers. The tough new state law treats drug addiction as a crime rather than a medical problem - and in certain cases it will mean life imprisonment for the sale or possession of hard drugs. It will be mandatory for users of certain drugs to be sent to jail for at least a year. Governor Rockefeller - who asked the State legislature for the new law - is authorized to name up to one hundred new judges to handle the expected increase in jury trials for offenders.

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President Nixon and Vice President Agnew will meet tomorrow in Washington to discuss the current investigation into Agnew's possible involvment on Maryland political irregularities. Presidential spokesman Gerald Warren says the Vice President requested the meeting to be held after Prestient Nixon returned from San Clemente smex somewhat earlier than originally expected. Also, in Washington a House investigator, Jack Brooks of Texas - charged today that a document ++ recording the sale of the President's San Clemente property - had been altered before copies of it were released by the White House earlier this week. The White House promptly rejected the charge and any suggestion of impropriety in the matter.
