From Houston to Detroit -- from Tucson to New York -- an air of tense apprehension tonight. With local, state and Federal officials in a dozen or more cities -- striving desperately to keep the lid on. Hoping to head off another night of terror -- in the most widespread racial strife in the nation's history.

In 2 Detroit, at least -- it appears that the situation is finally under control. Police, National Guardsmen and tough Army paratroopers today putting to rout -- the last of countless rioters, looters and snipers. At this moment -- still enforcing the peace at gunpoint. Yet even so -- the death toll is still going up.

Latest addition -- a policeman felled early today by a shotgun blast. Raising to twenty-five the number of dead in Detroit -- in three days of violence. Along with fifteen hundred injured -- and thousands more under arrest.

Be that as it may -- Dr. King also sent a telegram to President Johnson. Warning that Negro riots will spread -- unless Congress act "immediately upon some massive program to end Negro unemployment."

Dr. King going on to say -- that "revolts come out of revolting conditions." Adding that "a riot -- is the language of the unheard; it is a suicidal act -- that last desperate act -- when the Negro says, I'I'm tired of living like a dog.'"

Latest from Red China -- word today of full-scale revolt in the Red Army military district of Wuhan; largest industrial center -- in South Central China.

Threatening the province and the entire country -- with a relapse into war lord rule -- maybe civil war. Even Peking now admitting -- there is a "bitter struggle" for power in Wuhan. Adding that Mao supporters there are defending the central government -- "at the cost of their lives and blood."

The situation coming to light -- with news of the kidnaping of two major in the Peking government. A kidnaping alleged committed -- on direct authorization from Wuhan's top military command.

The two men later released -- at the insistence of Red China's Premier Chou En-Lai. However, Nationalist Chinese sources calling the incident -- "a punch right on Mao's nose -- and an open challenge to his authority as a dictator."
