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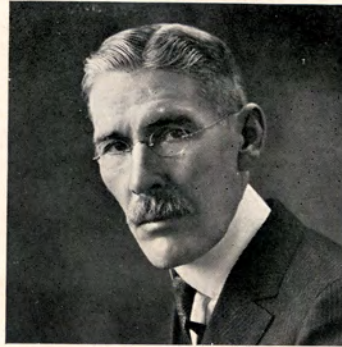
THE COACHES

MILLER, OF COLUMBIA

Fred Miller was a member of the Class of 1913 at Columbia. While at college he rowed on his freshman crew in 1908. He followed this with four years of Varsity experience in 1909, 1910, 1912 and 1913. Miller then sculled and rowed in eights representing the New York Athletic Club in 1914 and 1915. In the season 1922-23, Miller aided Jim Rice at Columbia. The following season he became Head Crew Coach.

HOYLE, OF CORNELL

John Hoyle first came to Cornell in 1899, as an expert boat builder and rigger. Since that time, all of Cornell's shells, with one exception, have been of his own design and making. For more than twenty years Hoyle worked under Coach Courtney, assuming the post of Assistant Coach in 1909. He absorbed much of the Courtney system and methods, and upon the death of the "Old Man," in 1920, was made his successor.



WRIGHT, OF PENNSYLVANIA

Joseph Wright, Pennsylvania coach since 1915, began rowing many years ago as a member of the famous Argonaut Club of Canada, of which he became captain and later coach. He has the enviable reputation of having rowed more amateur races than any other oarsman in America. Wright won an American championship in 1885, and twenty years later again captured the title.



TEN EYCK, OF SYRACUSE

James A. Ten Eyck has been rowing coach at Syracuse for twenty years. He has also coached for the Wachuset, Worcester, Ottawa and Duluth Boat Clubs, and at the U. S. Naval Academy. Of international reputation, he has developed numerous amateur and professional single-scull champions, among them three of the fastest scullers of the world, E. H. Ten Eyck, F. B. Greer and Edward Hanlan.

CALLOW, OF WASHINGTON

Russell ("Rusty") Callow, a former Purple and Gold oarsman under the great Hiram Connibear, graduated from the University of Washington in 1916. After graduation he was superintendent of a lumber mill, where he won the confidence of his loggers just as he won the confidence of his crew in his first year as coach. Callow succeeded Ed Leader, now coach at Yale.



VAIL, OF WISCONSIN

To Coach "Dad" Vail goes much of the credit for the excellent record that the University of Wisconsin has made on the water. He has been in charge of the sport at that University for many years and has developed several famous boats. Within the past few years he has aroused increased interest in the sport at Wisconsin, and rowing enthusiasts are expecting Vail's crews to give a good account of themselves today.

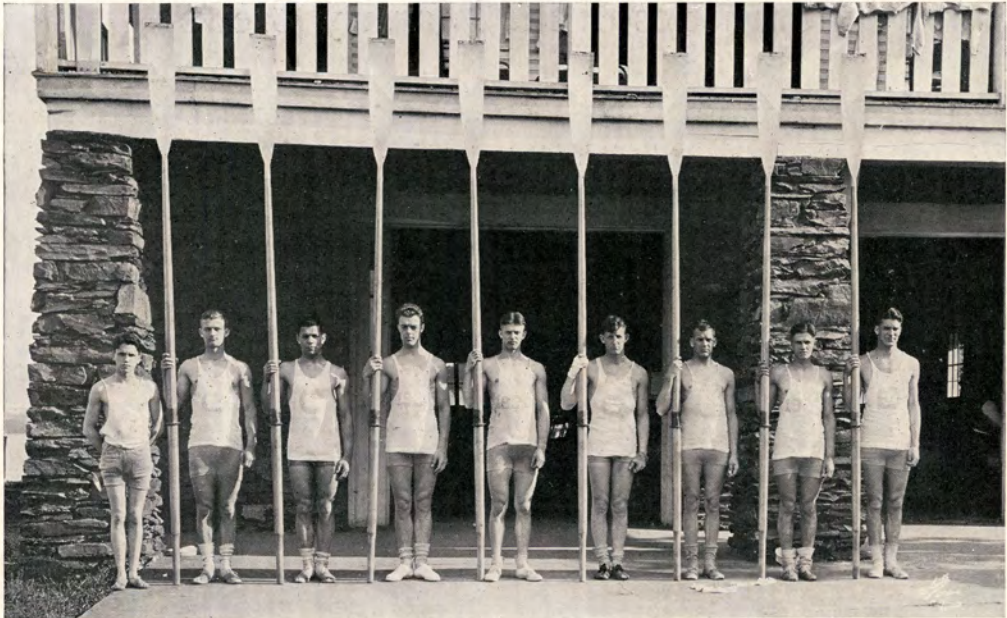

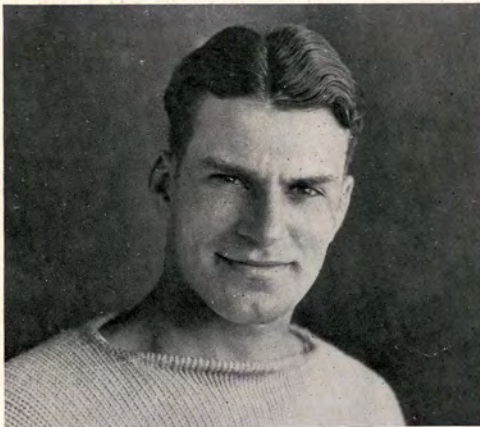

ROWING AT COLUMBIA

Rowing at Columbia dates back further than any other sport. The College took it up in the early '40's, when Harvard and Yale first turned their attention to the oars. In 1871, three years after the Rowing Association of American Colleges was organized, Columbia won her famous victory at Saratoga. The year 1878 saw the 'Varsity competing in its first international meet, the Visitors' Challenge Inter-University Race, over the historic Henley course in England. Rowing with a stroke a little over forty to the minute, they accomplished the unprecedented, and were masters in the first race ever won in England by a foreign crew.

Between 1877 and 1880 Columbia won 15 out of the 24 races entered. At Poughkeepsie the 'Varsity was the victor in 1895; in '01 pushed Cornell to break the record; and in 1914 won the Regatta.

Columbia opened the 1924 season on May 3rd at Derby. In this Regatta, 'Varsity, Junior 'Varsity and Freshmen lost to Yale and Pennsylvania.

The following Saturday, May 10, the Regatta scheduled between Columbia, Pennsylvania and Harvard on the Charles, was postponed because of rough water. Pennsylvania beat Harvard in the 'Varsity race which was rowed the following Monday. Faculty ruling prevented Columbia from remaining over.

On May 17, the Columbia 150-lb. crew defeated the M.I.T. 150-lb. eight on the Harlem River.

On May 31, the Columbia 150-lb. lost to Pennsylvania, but defeated Yale and Princeton in the 150-lb. race on the Schuylkill. The 'Varsity was beaten by Pennsylvania and Navy, but defeated Syracuse and Princeton in the feature race of the American Henley.

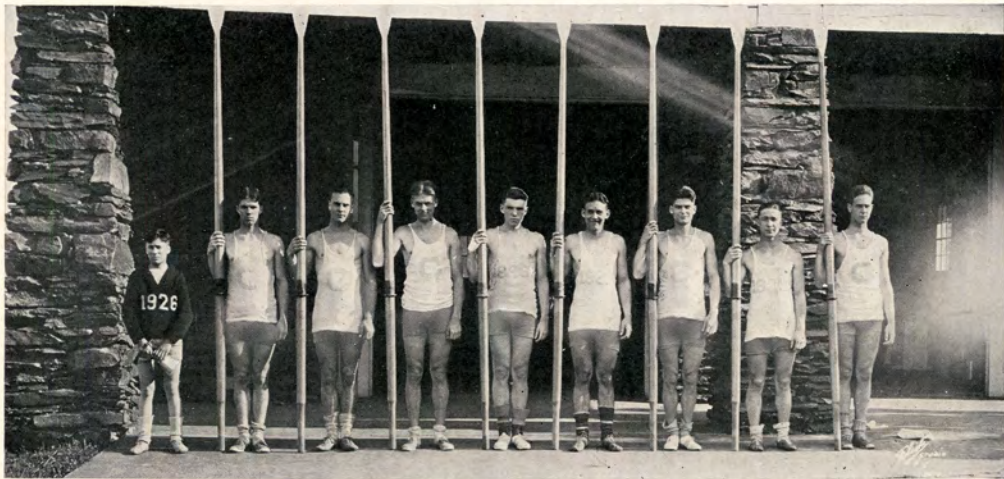

Junior Varsity Crew

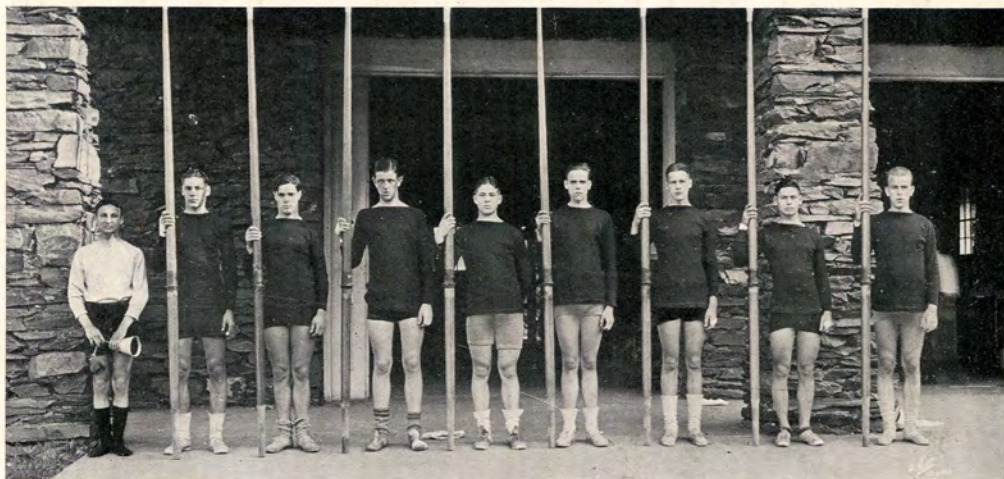

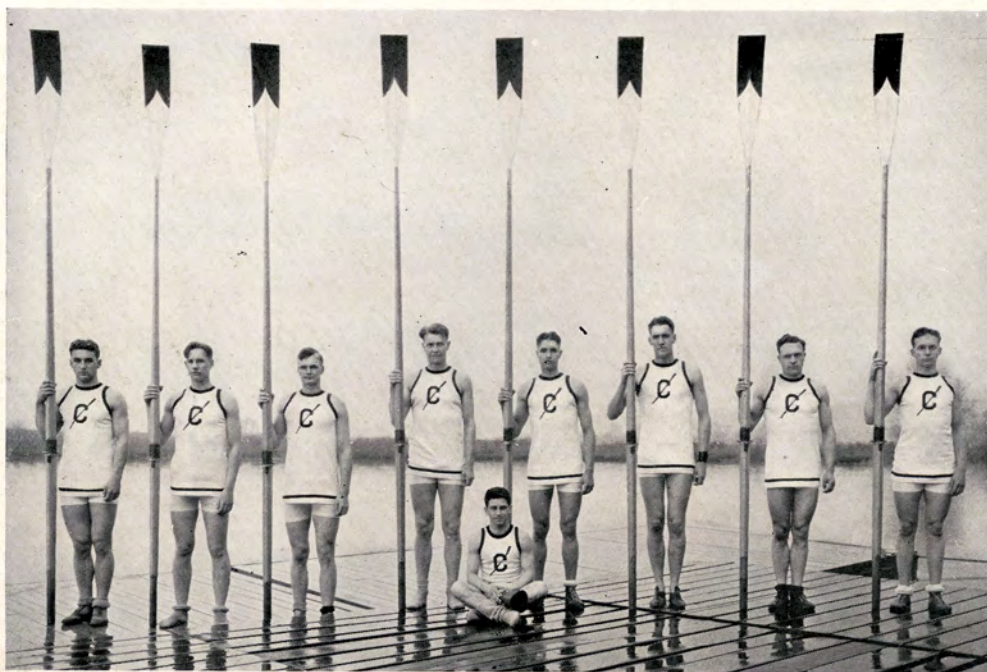

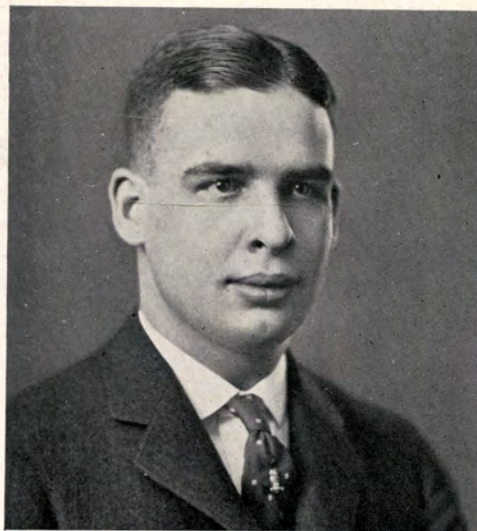

ROWING AT CORNELL

Interest in rowing at Cornell began almost with the founding of the University in 1868. After Mr. Courtney came to Cornell in 1878 as Crew Coach, successes for the Cornell crews began. From that time until 1920, when Mr. Courtney died, his crews made comparatively good records. Cornell holds many records on the Poughkeepsie course, including the 'Varsity four-mile, Freshman two-mile, four-oared two-mile, and Junior 'Varsity two-mile. Upon Mr. Courtney's death, John Hoyle took the helm.

The 1924 Season was opened on May 10, when a

Cornell 'Varsity trailed the Massachusetts Institute of Technology 'Varsity by three lengths in a two-mile race on Lake Cayuga. After considerable experimenting with time trials, Coach Hoyle and Assistant Coach Newman sent an entirely different crew consisting of last year's Freshman crew intact, with the exception of one position, against Yale and Princeton in the Carnegie Cup Regatta on Lake Carnegie. Cornell finished second, Yale winning by a wide margin. In the third race of the season the 'Varsity boat defeated Harvard by three lengths over the Henley distance rowed on Cayuga Inlet.

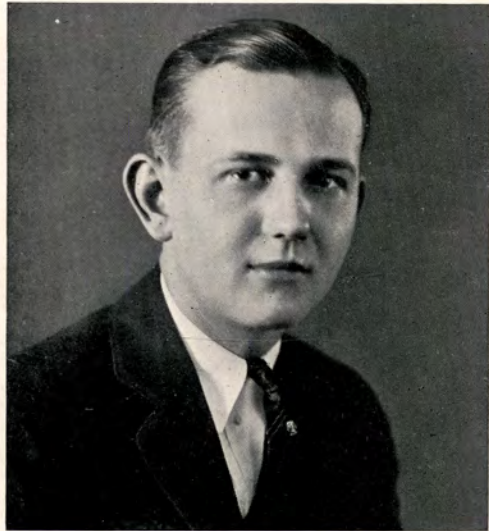

ROWING AT PENNSYLVANIA

Rowing at Pennsylvania began in 1854, with the formation of the University Barge Club. The first important series of intercollegiate races were those for the Childs Cup, between Pennsylvania, Columbia and Princeton. Between 1879 and 1891, Pennsylvania won eight and lost only two. In six of the Intercollegiate Regattas, started in 1880 and composed of crews from Pennsylvania, Princeton, Cornell, Wisconsin, Bowdoin, and Wesleyan, Pennsylvania won twice, was second twice, and third once. The first intercollegiates at Poughkeepsie, were held in 1895. That year the Pennsylvania Crew was wrecked, and took third place during the next two years. In 1898, 1899 and 1900 the Pennsylvania 'Varsity won the Regatta. In 1901 the 'Varsity crew competed in the Henley Regatta for

world honors, defeating the London Rowing Club and the Thames Rowing Club, and being defeated by a scant length by Leander.

Pennsylvania abandoned rowing during 1917, but established two course records during the next two years, one in the Childs Cup Race in 1918, and the other at Yale in 1919. In 1921 the crew defeated Yale and in the Intercollegiate Regatta, defeated Syracuse and Columbia. The next year the Penn crews won 8 first places, 4 seconds, and 3 thirds. Last year they lost 3 races to Navy; won 3 and lost 3 to Columbia; won 2 and lost 1 to Yale; won 1 and lost 1 to Harvard; and won 4 from Princeton. So far this season the Penn record has been as follows: won from Columbia at Derby, defeated the three Harvard crews on May 10, and won the Childs Cup and Steward's Cup at the American Henley on May 31st.

"JIM" RICE

James C. Rice was head coach at Columbia from 1907 to 1924, after having coached the Weld Boat Club at Harvard. Previous to that he had attained remarkable success at the Detroit Boat Club, where he developed many champions and many title winning crews. Rice is a protégé of Ned Hanlan, the famous sculler, and has been coaching for 32 years. This is his first year as assistant to Coach Wright of Pennsylvania. The latter is at present coaching the Penn oarsmen who will take part in the Olympic tryouts.

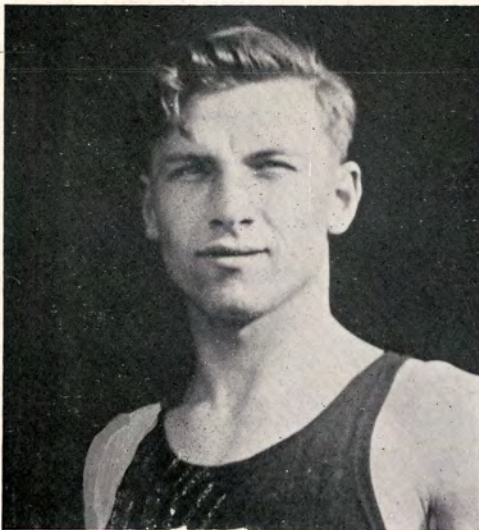

ROWING AT SYRACUSE

Rowing was organized at Syracuse University in 1900 under the direction of Mr. E. R. Sweetland. Handicapped by inexperience and poor training conditions, the first Orange crews were not very successful. In January, 1903, James A. Ten Eyck, of Worcester, Mass., was engaged to take charge of crew work. Under his able guidance, Syracuse forged rapidly to the front, and in 1904, the 'Varsity eight won the Poughkeepsie Regatta, repeating this performance in 1908, 1913, 1916 and 1920. The 1920 'Varsity after winning at Poughkeepsie, lost out by only a few feet to the Navy oarsmen, in the Olympic tryouts at

Worcester. The Junior 'Varsity and Freshmen boats also have a goodly number of victories marked up.

This year about fifty 'Varsity men and seventy-five freshmen reported for crew. Daily work-outs were held in the rowing tank, the only one of its kind in the world. On March 12, the crews took to the water on the outlet of Onondaga Lake. Hampered by lack of material and the stormy weather of a late spring, the crews were slow in getting started. They won their first race from Massachusetts Institute of Technology on May 3, and lost to the Navy at Annapolis on May 24 and to University of Pennsylvania on the Schuylkill on May 31.

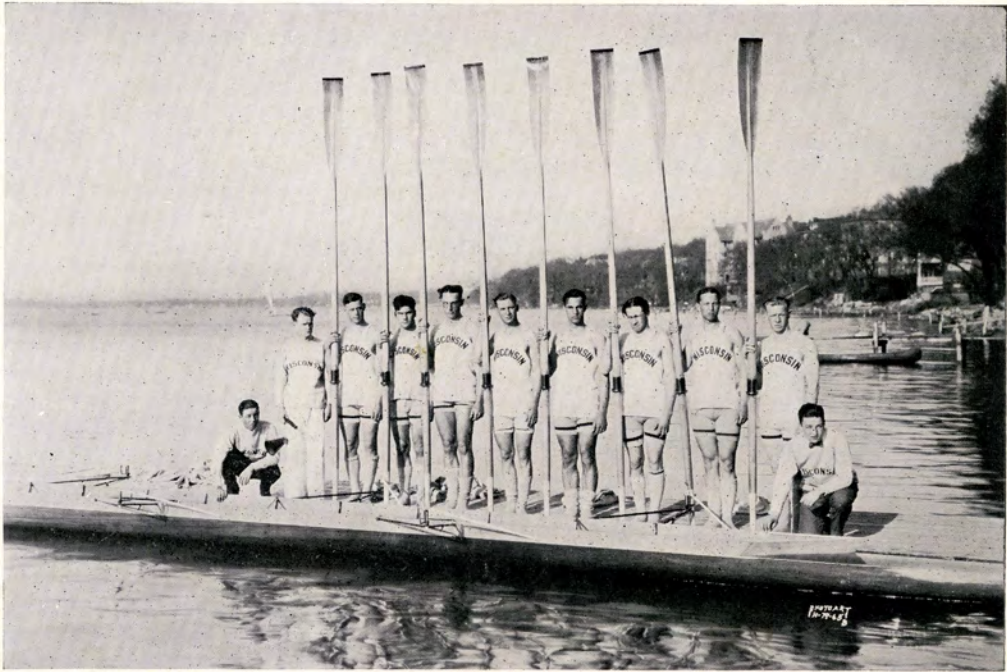

ROWING AT WISCONSIN

The University of Wisconsin Varsity Eight is taking part in the Intercollegiate Rowing Regatta at Poughkeepsie for the first time in a decade. Old followers of the great water sport will welcome Coach "Dad" Vail back to Poughkeepsie where for years he was an important personage who always had to be reckoned with.

It was just ten years ago that the Wisconsin crew was last entered at Poughkeepsie. For several years interest in rowing was on the wane at Wisconsin, and it was the only institution in the Western Conference

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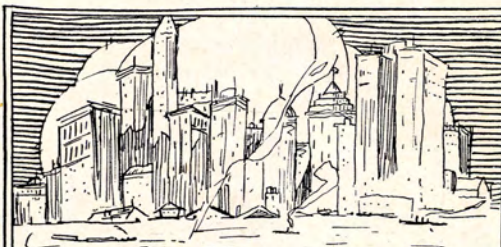
