Australia and Belgium abstained from voting.

Following the British-French veto, in the Security Council, last night, the mext logical step is - a meeting of the General Assembly, where there is no veto.

At the U.N. tonight it was Yugoslavia that called - for a session of the General Assembly of the United Nations. The emergency meeting that now is scheduled for tomorrow to consider the attack on Egypt. Action in the Security Council was blocked by those British and French vetoes last night. So the next logical step was - the General Assembly, where there is no veto. And the United States favored the Yugoslav proposal.

Today, one country after another denounced the attack on Egypt. Soviet Russia, India, various nations of Europe. The Canadian government suspended all arms shipments to Israel - and, at Ottawa, Minister of External Affairs, Lester Pearson, called the British-French vetoes last night "deplorable."

Perhaps the U.N. General Assembly might proclaim that Britain, France and Israel - are aggressors.

But then - what?

All that - is for the future.

SUEZ - INVASION

Egypt is under air attack, tonight. British and
French bombers blasting targets - at Alexandria, and key
points along the Suez Canal. The British Foreign Secretary
denies that Cairo has been bombed.

The Egyptians report - little damage and few casualties. But, from British-French headquarters on Cyprus, the word is - that violent air assaults are in progress. Aiming - to knock out airfields, from which Egyptian planes might fly against invading forces.

The actual invasion - to begin within twenty-four hours, according to a communique. The landings along the coast - may have begun by now. Heavy bombing - as a preparation. The British and French - hurling their forces to seize the Suez Canal.

Israel claims a major victory in the Sinai desert, and says - armored units drove within ten miles of the Suez canal. Which would put them inside the ten mile zone sort of "neutralized" area, demanded by the British-French ultimatum. No indication of Israeli forces - remaining in that sone.

The big victory, however, is said to have been won in a sector between the frontier and a line - halfway to the Suez Canal. The communique states the Egyptians were - "engulfed". Meaning, of course, swift encirclement by a motorized army. Egypt says - attacks repelled.

Tonight's dispatch states that part of the Reselt
force is cutting around, northward. The objective being the Gasa strip, along the Palestine coast.

Today, the Jerusalem-Israeli radio broadcast

warnings to the people in the Gasa strip - that the whole area was about to be cut off by the Israeli advance. Which raises - a question:-/

There are some three hundred thousand people in the Gaza strip - including myriads of Area refugees from Palestine. People - who lost their homes. Their bitterness - one of the reasons for Area hostilities toward Israel. So now, what will happen - when and if the Israelis take over the Gaza strip, with all those refugees.

The war bulle time include an account of air action.

The Israeli Air Force - said to have shot down seven

Egyptian planes. Including - Russian-built MIGS. Egypt

Temports the shooting down of Israeli planes. An Egyptian

warship was captured at Haifa, a Frigate - which

surrendered, when attacked by Israeli vessels and aircraft.

The British Admiralty said today the cruiser Newfoundland has sunk an Egyptian frigate.

An Admiralty spokesman said the sinking occurred while the 8,800-ton cruser was on "shipping protection duties in the Gulf of Suez" last night.

The Gulf is at the Red Sea end of the Suez Canal.

He said the British "encountered an Egyptian frigate which failed to answer a challenge or to stop when called upon to do so."

"She was therefore sunk and survivors were taken on board the Newfoundland.

It was the second Egyptian frigate lost in the new fighting. The other was disabled and captured by the Israelis in a small air-sea battle in the Eastern Mediterranean.

Israeli attack - an excuse for the British and French to

seize the Suez Canal. And - bring about the downfall of

Nasser, the Egyptian Premier.

Israel, to get a pay-off in the end, which would include British-French support for an Israeli claim to the Palestinian territories of Jordan. At any rate, that's one surmise in Washington.

Then, on Monday, Israel struck suddenly - at Egypt.

 Today, Cardinal Mindszenty came back to Budapest returning to the Arch-episcopal palace. Where he was
arrested by the Reds - on the day after Christmas,
nineteen forty-eight. Held a prisoner for six years.

The homecoming - quiet, without ceremony.

Cardinal Mindszenty merely holding - a news conference

with reporters. Who say - the sixty-four year old prelate

looked weary. But he told the newsmen, "Thank God, I am

in good health, both physically and mentally - although

I was very seriously ill while I was in prison."

They asked him - what illnesses ...

"I had so many," he replied, "I couldn't even enumerate them." But then he repeated, "both physically and mentally, I am now perfectly alright."

The use of the word "mentally" was the more

significant - because at his trial, the Cardinal had confessed - admitting charges of treason. And, at the time, it was thought - he looked broken in spirit.

Possibly - on account of a Stalinist ordeal, which produced those notorious confessions.

Today, by the way, the new Titoist government of Hungary announced - that the charges were "null and void." Without - "legal basis." The accusations - on which Cardinal Mindszenty was given a sentence of life imprisonment.

Beside the prelate at the news interview stood
a couple of young Hungarian soldiers - who helped in
liberating him. They told the reporters - that the
rescue was accidental, in a way. The doing of cadets and
officers at a tank school in a town, sixty-five miles north
of Budapest. Who were curious - about a "mysterious"

prisoner" held in an old castle in that neighborhood, for more than a year.

So, when the revolution swept on to success, they decided to investigate - find out who the "mysterious they prisoner" was. And at the old castle, were surprised to discover - Cardinal Archbishop Mindszenty, the Primate of Hungary.

During the years of imprisonment, he had been taken from one place to another. Finally, in secrecy, to the castle - where he was the prisoner of the Red Secret Police.

When he was rescued, he was guarded by only a few secret policemen - who intended to hold the Cardinal as a hostage for their own safety. They were told they wouldn't be harmed - and willingly surrendered.

Today, there was talk in Budapest - that Cardinal Mindszenty might become a member of the new government of Hungary.

The President will make a campaign speech in Philadelphia, tomorrow night. Because of the crisis, he cancelled a trip to Texas, Oklahoma and Tennessee, which he was to have made today. Instead - he'll make that report on radio and television to the American people, tonight. Explaining - the stand of the U.S. government in the mid-eastern trouble.

He may make an electioneering address in Boston,

Monday night - but that depends on how international

events develop. Presidential Secretary, Jim Hagerty,

says - the President is not considering any other campaign

appearances. The flare-up of war - having curtailed his

political activities, during the last week of the battle

for ballots.

Washington, of course, is buzzing - trying to guess the effect of the outbreak of war on the voting, Tuesday,

of next week. The Republicans whink it will be favorable because the people are likely to rally to the President in a time of such emergency. The Democrats, on the gontrary, think that it all shows Adlai Stevenson is right in criticizing that Eisenhower foreign policy. Also, the President, by calling on the U.N. to condemn Israel - may lose Jewish votes.

However, there is that report - that the President has ordered top administration officials to take no account of political considerations. Don't let politics influence the handling of the American part in the mid-eastern flare-up.

Adlai Stevenson accuses President Eisenhower and Secretary of State, John Foster Dulles, of being responsible, in part - for the outbreak of war. He says they must bear, what he calls, "a heavy responsibility."

Before a crowd of thirty-six hundred, in New York's garment center today, Stevenson said -- "By every consideration of law, moral and spiritual obligation and faith - this nation is bound to support the integrity of Israel."
