There was rejoicing in Washington today - at the State Department, and at the Embassy of West Germany.

The landslide victory for Chancellor Adenauer, in the West German election, turned out to be an overwhelming endorsement of the pro-American policy -- and of the plan for West German re-armament within the framework of the European army of NATO.

The State Department sees it, likewise, as vindication of Secretary of State Dulles - who came out with a cheer for Adenauer just beforein the election.

The Dulles declaration was assailed maxim angrily by the German Social Democrats, as - American intervention - and criticized here in this country too.

The victory in the voting yesterday, was a stunning triumph. The Chancellor's party, the Christian Democrats taking more than forty-five percent of the total. Four years ago they had won the ty-one percent.

Together with two other parties in alliance with the Christian Democrats, the Chancellor swept nearly fifty-eight percent of the vote. Nearly sixteen million out of twenty-seven and a half million. The Social Democrat opposition polled about eight million - less than twenty-nine percent.

Overwhelming defeats were suffered by the Communists and the pro-nazi party. Neither one wins a single seat in the West German parliament.

Adenauer now has three hundred six out of four hundred eighty-seven parliamentary seats. Social Democrats - one hundred fifty. The remainder - divided among minor parties.

Another phase of the prisoner-of-war proceedingsbegan today. The allies - transporting to the neutral
zone captives who refuse to return to the Reds. Nearly
fifteen thousand Chinese, nearly eight thousand North
Koreans. All that were left - after Syngman Rhee
turned loose tens of thousands of prisoners. In the
neutral zone, they are being placed in camps and
guarded by troops of India - and Communist
representatives will have a chance to talk with them
and persuade them to go back, if possible.

Similarly, under the same provision in the armistice, the Reds will take to the neutral zone - prisoners who refuse to return to our side. Some four hundred, as we hear, most of them Nouth Koreans. A few Americans.

The truce provides that allied representatives
will have a chance to talk to them - trying to persuade
persuade them to return home. As for the Americans
who refuse repatriation, I don't see why we should be

so eager to bring them back to this country. Let them stay in the realm of the Reds, if they want to.

The prisoner exchange has been completed, and a final headline tells of U.S. flyers who confessed
to do t - farced

germ warfare. Forced - by torture and the threat of death.

A Marine Corps Colonel, with a record of shooting down MIGS, tells how he was kept in a sort of cage outside a Korean house. Told - he would stay there until he made a germ warfare confession.

Who would fit in any smart gathering - at London, Paris, New York/ The man who today sits on the Peacock throne went to school in Switzerland, and received a completely western education. He even speaks KK excellent English.

L.T.: Not the play-boy type, I hope; not like Farouk, the roistering King, who was tossed out of Egypt?

MAXP Not in the least. The present Persian monarch absorbed the other side of western culture - especially the liberal political ideas of the West.

He is actually determined to establish constitutional government in the land of Cyrus and Darius - a land that has only known dictators. His dreams for have years xxx been to put xx into effect a sweeping program of xxxx social and economic reforms. My job at one time was to help him on that.

That sounds rather advanced for a country inhabited by nomadic tribes like the mountain people of Azerbaijan, and the Bactiari.

population are nomadic tribes. The rest are settled villagers and townspeople. Anyway, today, the chiefs of the principal tribes have European educations - and have western ideas - like the Shah. So they'll understand what he's doing.

Besides, the Shah has been working away at his reform program since Nineteen Forty-six - except when it was broken off by the oil dispute - and Mossadegh. So nearly all the Persian people by now

With any reasonable support from us he'll do it, too.
