WHITE HOUSE

At the White House - President Ford today signed into law an extension of domestic oil price controls - till mid-November. He also made it plain he holds Congress to blame for failure to work an over-all energy plan. "The President saying: "When the price of gasoline goes up at the service station - I want the American people to know exactly where the blame lies."

The President leaves tomorrow - on a two day trip to the middle west - his first since the incident in San Francisco a week ago. He will return Thursday to welcome Emperor Hirohito.

And now...

SUPREME COURT

Justice William O. Douglas - is on the job again. Earlier in the year he had a stroke. Today he was **by** at the Supreme Court for the first time since March. Apparently this clears the way for certain action; including the death penalty - which had been put off pending a full court. BARCELONA

The weekend execution of five terrorists in Spain has led to a sense is strike by thousands so in the Basque part of Spain. In Barcelona there was a payroll robbery apparently staged by Basque guerrillas who shot and wounded two gendarmes and then made off with half a million in cash. UNITED NATIONS FOLLOW BARCELONA

Meanwhile at the UN. a call for a meeting of the Security Council. Mexico ready to demand sanctions against Spain - for disregard of human rights; which is branded by Spain as an intolerable interference - in Spain's domestic affairs.

POINT BARROW

At Point Barrow off the northern tip of Alaska a sudden change in Arctic winds, clearing a passage twelve miles wide through the ice pack in the Beaufort Sea - enabling that fleet of ships to **dekiner** push on with the billion dollars worth of vital pipeline equipment they have for Prudhoe, Bay: BEIRUT

The newest cease fire in Beirut - seems to be holding - with residents coming out of their homes by the thousands - to clean up the debris, after the two weeks of fighting. The clean up has including tisclosed more bodies raising the death toll to at

least three-hundred and thirty-eight.

ZAMBOANGA CITY

A Japanese freighter and crew seized by forty Moslem pirates - were freed today thanks to a Philippine Admiral. In a brief confrontation - off Zamboanga - the Southern Philippines - Admiral Romulo Espaldon signaled the pirates to give up - or he'd wipe them out -- all of them. They knew he meant it and would, so the pirates gove up their prize.
