## GOOD EVENING EVERYBODY:

In London, moves to begin preparations for a bigtime East-West conference in April. British Foreign
Secretary Selwyn Lloyd - in talks with the envoy from
West German Chancellor Adenauer.

They are discussing a reply to Moscow proposals for a conference on German reunification and the question
of Berlin. The United States and France - to play their
part in drafting an answer.

Diplomatic sources in London say the Western powers will propose an East-West meeting of the Foreign Ministers to gather in Geneva, late in April.

Later news, today, is - that the political uproar in Monaco brings to a climax a conflict that has been going on for years. A republican faction in the council, the parliament - making efforts to limit the absolute power of Prince Rainier.

We think of Monaco as a sort of comic opera principal
principality - the gambling realm of Monte Carlo. Prince
Rainier - one of the few despotic monarchs left on this earth.
Who, last year, condescended to let the Council have some small degree of authority.

But, it seems, the Council became too independ
independent. Some of its members advocating - a Republic of
Monaco. 2

So, today, Prince Rainier suspended the constitution of Monaco. Asserting - his own absolute authority.

At the moment, it doesn't seem as the operatta principality will have a revolution pxin - in the style of

On Monday, Fidel Castro will begin the distribution of land among the peasants in Oriente Province. Castro, in person - to deliver titles to the first of the small farmers, who'll get allotments. The revolutionary leader - making quite a ceremony of this. The distribution of land - to be celebrated by a huge mass meeting.

An official account - of the missile situation. How does our American armament of rockets - compare with that of Soviet Russia?

A congressional committee wanted information about this. Calling - Secretary of Defense McElroy as a witness.

So he, today, gave an account - based on the latest intelligence reports. Collated - by a REER special board. Meaded - by Allen Dulles, Chief of the EXEX Central Intelligence Agency.

On the basis of this information, Secretary McElroy told the committee - that neither Soviet Russia for the United States have has, at this moment, an intercontinental missile, capable of going into operation, in the event of war. But we'll be first to have one. A squadron armed with the Atlas I.C.B.M. will be ready to fire - in July. But, after that, I the Soviets will forge ahead of us - in the number of intercontinental ballistic missiles that they'll have.

Secretary McElroy said - we don't intend to match

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Russia - missile for missile. Our program being - more diversified. Relying - on a variety of weapons to deter war. The 1.C.B.M., and - missile-firing submarines. Also - Air Force bombers, armed with hydrogen bombs.

He added - that the Soviets will have an I.C.B.M.

of greater power than any produced in the United States.

Which, he explained will help the Russians on outer space

projects - but not - in a military way. Because the U.S.

Atlas, with its range of fifty-five hundred miles, has

enough power to reach any target - do it with hydrogen

bomb warheads. More power, he explained, might merely

mean - that you would overshoot the mark.

The Secretary's testimony was promptly challenged by Senator Symington of Missouri, who declared - that our Central Intelligence people under-estimate the capabilities of the Soviets in producing missiles.

The Congressional battle on civil rights began, a today. With/bi-partisan group of Senators - introducing a bill for government action in the school integration crisis. Fifteen legislators, headed by Senator Douglas of Illinois, introduced a measure - that would provide federal aid in establishing integrated schools. This drastic bill in opposition to a moderate measure proposed by Democratic Leader Senator Lyndon Johnson of Texas. Also in opposition - to civil rights legislation which the Alministration intends to propose.

Actually, today's bill is part of a parliamentary maneuver. The measure - going to the Senate Judiciary Committee, the Chairman of which is Senator Eastland of Mississippi, a strong segregationish. The measure - having

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which is virtually certain to okay Lyndon Johnson's moderate legislation.

But then, on the floor of the Senate, the liberals will try to kake tack on their proposals in the form of amendments.

Congressional opinion seems to be - that President Eisenhower's farm proposals, today - have little chance of success. The White House asking - for a reduction of farm price supports. Such - as are producing "excessively expensive" agricultural surpluses.

Even Rak Republican leaders are saying privately that there's little chance of Congress voting any reduction
