The Democratic whoop-it-up has been going on for three days -- with no end of hullaballoo. Fresh from the whistle stops further west, President Trumam hit Chicago with one of those rip-snorting Truman talks -- altogether political.

TRYGVE LIE

In Moscow Trygve Lie had his wish today -- the
Secretary General of the United Nations having gone to
Soviet Russia in the hope of seeing Stalin. He wants to
do something to ease the Cold War, and bring an end to
the deadlock that threatens the United States. left with
the belief that Conferences with Soviet leaders might help.

Especially -- a talk with Stalin. So now that has taken
place -- but we have not any idea what was said. All we
tonight
have is an announcement on the Moscow radio -- terse, brief,
giving the one fact and nothing else.

CONFERENCE

In London today, there was a meeting of the

North Atlantic Council - delegates of the twelve

countries of the Atlantic Security Pact. They gathered

to devise policies for the west, in the cold war
and were joined by the foreign ministers of the Big

Three, who had concluded their own headline threign

conference over the weekend.

We don't know much about those Big Three deliberations - Messrs. Acheson, Bevin and Schuman having issued only a fairly general announcement, not too much let out. Which you can also apply to the first session of the North Atlantic Council today - the communique merely stating that the delegates decided on strong diplomatic policy to keep the cold war from being a hot war. "Total diplomacy", that is.

moscow- Iran.

aerial photographs of Russian territory are being taken along the border of Iran, and that Americans are participating in the survey from the sky. Moscow claims that the purpose is - military, as well as geological. There's a quest for oil along the Caspian Sea, the Soviet frontier, and Moscow declares that the aerial photographs include Russian territory - and have a military angle. Moreover, that Americans are taking part in all this. Hence, a diplomatic protest has been sent by Moscow to the Iranian Government.

A political upset in Turkey -- where the Opposition Party has won a striking victory over the President Ismet Inonu. The votes were cast yesterday, but the count has just come in, showing a majority of six hundred and sixteen thousand to four hundred and fifty-eight thousand -- against the Republican People's Party, the group headed by President Inonu.

This is all the more surprising, considering recent history. Ever since the rise of the New Turkey under the leadership of Mustapha Kemal Ataturk, the official faction has been the Republican People's Party -- founded by Ataturk himself. And his great fame, as the creator of the Turkish Republic was great enough to keep the party predominant. Moreover, President Inonu had the prestige of being the protege and successor of Ataturk.

But the unexpected occurred. A victory for the Democratic Party, founded only four years ago. Nine of the Cabinet have been defeated for seats in the Turkish Parliament, and it looks as if Inonu will go out as President, succeeded by the triumphant Opposition.

Senator Chavez of New Mexico is sticking to his charge that Louis Budenz, former editor of the Communistable Daily Worker, is using the Catholic Church as a cover for false accusations. The New Mexico senator who calls Budenz a liar, a conspirator, an ex-bigamist, and a hyprocrite, has given his opinion that Budenz is still a Communist, a Red planted in the church.

Catholic Fordham University, where Budenz is a professor of economics. The Reverend Laurence J.

McGinley defends him in the strongest of terms, declaring that is doing a Christian duty by exposing the Communists. He calls the Chavez attack false and unfair - as bad as the raging assaults against Budenz in the Communist press.

Replying to this, the senator notes again today
that he, himself, is a Gatholic - and is of Spanish
descent. Fordham is a Jesuit University, and the
founder of the Jesuit order was a Spanish saint, which
leads Senator Chavez to say: "I'm not getting into any

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happen to be a descendant of the same race as the one who started the Jesuit order - so I can, and to, respect the cloth. To which he adds that, nevertheless he sticks to his accusations against Louis Budenz.

Senator McCarthy of Wisconsin delivered a blast today, which he called - "The roughest yet." Well, It certain, was rough. He charged a State Department conspiracy to sell out the Far East to Communism. He named, what he called, "A three-man axis," Secretary of State Dean Acheson, Ambassador-at-large Philip Jessup, and Far Eastern expert Owen Lattimore. He said that Acheson had joined the other two in a pretense of anti-Communism - while, at the same time, conniving to aid Communism in China and other parts of East Asia. The Senator called the policy - "A victous hoax and fraud. Certainly - a grave accusation, even in these days of reckless charges flung right and left.

All this is accompanied by a retort from the

State Department - as bitter RRY as anything that

McCarthy, himself, has hurled. Today press officer

Lincoln White said that McCarthy was - a premediated

liar. He made a special reference to talk about George

Wheeler, whom McCarthy describes as a State Department

employee. Recently, this George Wheeler turned

publicly against American Democracy, went over to the side of the Reds, and decided to live behind the Iron Curtain. Today's denial states that Wheeler actually worked for the foreign economic administration during the war, was transferred temporarily to the State Department, and two months later was sent to the War Department. So he was never checked by the State Department Security Board - never, really, an employee of the Department.

Ambassador-at-large Philip Jessup - admitting that

Jessup had sponsored two dinners for the American
Russian But that, he said, was to honor the late

President Franklin D. Roosevelt and improve relations

between the United States and Soviet Russia.

SUPREME COURT

The Supreme Court agrees to consider two cases that challenge President Truman's loyalty program.

They are test cases, brought forward by two organizations listed as subversive by the Department of Justice. The National Council of American-Soviet friendship and the joint anti-Fascist refugee committee, both denounced as dominated by Communists.

To which they respond that loyalty program action, branding them as subversive, is unconstitutional. So now the Supreme Court agrees to rule on that question.

The spy story of Judy Coplon had elements of romance all along, and now a new climax - the young woman, convicted of espionage, becoming engaged to an associate of her defense lawyers. She met Albert Socolov while she was on trial, and now they are to be married - in spite of the fact that the intended bride is under a prison sentence, found guilty of espionage in two trials. She is now appealing.

When the young woman employee of the Department of Justice was charged with conspiring to give secret government documents to the Soviet engineer, Gubitchev - she said she was in love with Gubitchev. Not espionage, but romance. Later, that theme of sentiment was complicated by evidence that, simultaneously, Judy had been romancing with a Department of Justice lawyer, named Shapiro. She was convicted, and so was Gubitchev, sentenced as a Soviet spy, and deported to Russia.

While all this was going on, Judy met Albert
Socolov, connected with the law firm which took over her
defense in her second trial. They were called in, when

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she dismissed her previous attorney, Archibald Palmer.

"It wasn't until then," Judy said today, "that I really
got to know him."

To which the intended bridegroom adds: "I believe Judy is innocent. And I am confident she will be vindicated by the courts."

He's working on her appeal, and they're going to be married - bringing to a romantic high spot the case which all along has mingled espionage with romance.

GLENN MCCARTHY

That fabulous multi-millionaire oil man of Texas, Glenn McCarthy, says he's likely to withdraw his application for a seventy million dollar loan from the government. His vast empire of oil has run into a financial crisis, and he wanted to borrow all those millions from the reconstruction finance corporation. But now he thinks there isn't much chance of the giant loan - so he has turned for money to a couple of big insurance companies.

Well, Glenn McCarthy m has become something of a figure of legend - with his dizzy rise to the height of multi-millions. He's the owner of the Shamrock Hotel in Houston, the opening of which, a couple of years ago, was a headline extravaganza, featuring an amount of high jinx in the gaudy tradition of mining magnates and petroleum potentates.

But something went wrong in that empire of oil developments connected with imports of petroleum, says
Glenn McCarthy. He explains that there has been a
fifty per cent decrease of income in his enormous
business in the black gold pumped from underground.

Pyrenes - carrying a torch.

Frankie saw Ava, but not the bullfighter. The toreador was away making scenes for a movie, in which he appears with the Hollywood actress. Also writing poetry to her, no doubt - Spanish gossip telling of sonnets and odes of adoration the bullfighter has been rhyming.

SUBSTITUTE LEAD -- RESCUE

The latest tonight leaves the question blank --how or why Mrs. Jeannette Bugay ever got herself perched on a rock in the middle of Niagara Falls. After hours in the hospital, she was questioned and said -- "she doesn't know". The twenty-five year old wife of a taxi driver and mother of three children has been in a nervous state for some days, and last night went for a walk on the American side of Miagara River. She says she doesn't remember anything until she found herself in the water, thrust by the swift current against & small rocky island. 25 There she remained all night. on a ledge a mere two hundred yards from the point where the mighty cataract tumbles over the brink.

adventure by helicopter. When they spotted Mrs. Bugay, firemen and policemen tried vainly to get a rope to her. No go - the current was too powerful, so near the brink of Niagara Falls. Then a helicopter, from the Bell Aircraft Company nearby, flew to the rescue, piloted by Owen Neihaus and Joseph Cannon. Arriving at the small rocky island the helicopter hovered down alongside, and Neihaus was able to get a rope around Mrs. Bugay.

But the flying machine was so low that a big wave of the gurning water hit it, and wrecked it. The helicopter plunged into the water. So did the two flyers and Mrs. Bugay - who, with a rope around her,

was pulled from the rock. And there they were in the mighty current, as it swept toward the falls, three hundred feet away! They clung to the wrecked helicopter - which, itself, was being carried down toward the roaring abyss of Niagara. The broken flying machine was swept for fifty feet, and then lodged against a rock - steel body, struts and blaces, wedged firmly. Lucky for those three people hanging on - so near to the ocean of water pouring over the chasm.

Another helicopter, sent to the rescue, came
hovering down to where they were, and lowered a rope.

In the water, Owen Neihaus grabbed the rope - and tied
it to the wreck of the flying machine. Whereupon the
helicopter in the air carried the rope to another island
upstream, and dropped it to people waiting there. They
tied their end to a tree - and now there was a rope
extending from the island to the wrecked helicopter.

A small rowboat was hooked to the rope, and, playing out the rope, they let the boat drift down-stream, to the three people clinging to the wreckage.

When it got to them, flyers Neihaus and Cannon put

Mrs. Bugay aboard, and Neihaus got in - there was only

room for two. They were hauled safely to the island

upstream, and then the boat was sent back to Cannon,

who got aboard, and was pulled to safety.

Ingenious, complicated operation - and all at the very verge of the stupendous plunge of Niagara Falls.
